4 Local Wines Awarded For Excellence
On July 21st, four Okanagan Falls wineries were presented with

Lie Honourable Judith Guichon, Lieutenant Governor of BC. Members of the Consular Corps of BC representing 14 countries were also in attendance to gain knowledge of BC's renowned wine industry.

The 2015 Lieutenant Governor Award recipients are: BC Wine Studio, located at Hawk's Vineyard, for the 2012 Siren's Call Syrah; Wild Goose Vineyards and Winery for the 2014 Mystic River Gewürztraminer; Noble Ridge Vineyard and Winery for the 2010 The One Sparkling; and Blasted Church Vineyards for the 2012 Holy Moly Petit Verdot.

All wineries in BC were invited to submit their wines for judging. This year, 425 wines from 116 wineries were considered by a panel of 9 renowned judges. There were 84 semi-finalists, 30 finalists, and just 14 wines selected as winners. There was no accident these wines won, as every wine was tasted 21 times each by the 9 judges. To have 4 of these 14 winners located right in Okanagan Falls ... perhaps its time for a local wine tour to discover these award winning wines for yourself!

# "Summer Camping Summer Fun!"

As I write this month's column, my wife Pat and I are enjoying a week of camping with four of our grandchildren at the Sorrento Centre on Shuswap Lake. Summer camp has become sort of an annual tradition each year when we "older folks" get to try our hand at "parenting" once again - although we've discovered it's not as easy as it used to be!

Much as we're in the middle of summer there's still lots of interesting things going on in Area D.

Restructuring the Okanagan Falls Office ~ As some of you may have heard, we've decided to reorganize the function and purpose of the RDOS office located in the IGA shopping centre in downtown Okanagan Falls. For the past several years, this office has been largely devoted to promoting economic development under the capable leadership of John Powell, following the closure of the Weyerhaueser mill in 2007. We're now moving toward a more comprehensive and locally responsive form of service delivery, using the Okanagan Falls office as a "one stop shop" for a range of community programs and services within Area 'D'; these will include matters of land use, community development, seniors services, transit and transportation, tourism, parks and recreation, public safety and other services as needed.

Presently RDOS Human Resources is searching for a well-qualified individual to manage the Rural Services Office in Okanagan Falls. For further information about this position, you should call Ms. Marnie Manders, the RDOS Human Resources Manager at 250-490-4138.

Words of Appreciation to John Powell ~ On behalf of the ratepayers of Area 'D' and all those clients who he has served so effectively these past five years, I offer my sincere words of gratitude to John Powell. John, we all thank you sincerely and wish you well in your future career path.

Parkland Agreement Reached in Heritage Hills ~ As a result of prolonged and complex negotiations, an agreement has now been reached between Vintage Views Developments Ltd and the Regional District (RDOS) to provide a 4.6 acre sized parcel (almost 2 hectares) of land on which to develop a new neighborhood park for the Heritage Hills and Lakeshore Highlands communities. The park purchase agreement was signed by Mr. John Aantjes for Vintage Views on July 15th, and approved by the RDOS Board of Directors on July 16th. It includes the following:

- A donation by Vintage of a 3.4 acre parcel of land to the immediate East of the present Vintage Views subdivision, including a small riparian area, in exchange for a tax receipt equivalent to the fair market value of the donated 3.4 acre parcel with a number of added improvements (site leveling, top soil, a water line and a constructed concrete sports box).
- The purchase by the Regional District of an additional .93 acres of potential residential property at the South end of the donated parcel, valued by current appraisal at \$400,000.
- A lease-to-purchase option for one additional residential lot of 0.38 acres, also to be appended to the proposed park for a lease period of up to 20 years.

The final closing date of the park purchase agreement is on or before December 31, 2015, once a number of precedent conditions have been removed by each party. Funds for the RDOS purchase portion of the agreement will be taken from the recently approved Parkland Borrowing Bylaw No. 2685 and existing Area 'D' park reserves.

My compliments to our CAO, Mr. Bill Newell, to our legal counsel, Mr. Richard Thompson, and to Mr. John Aantjes of Vintage Views for bringing this long-awaited community park a major step closer to reality. I look forward to its future development under the guidance of the Okanagan Falls Parks and Recreation Commission and the residents of Heritage Hills/Lakeshore Highlands.

**Update on the Area D-1 OCP Review** ~ Thanks to the diligent efforts of our citizens review committee, RDOS staff, and EcoPlan Consultants, we have passed the 2/3 point in preparing a draft report on amendments to the Official Community Plan for Area D-1. The Committee met again on July 23rd for a tour of the DRAO radiotelescope facility at White Lake followed by a discussion of several new subjects including; long-term protection of the radio interference-free zone around the DRAO facility, the possibility of smaller (8 Ha) parcel sizes in Ag-zoned areas, and considerations pertaining to the future development of parks, recreation and trails on the West side of Skaha Lake.

Governance Study Project Underway ~ The governance review committee recently approved the Terms of Reference and a formal Call for Proposals, for the selection of a well-qualified consultant to assist with the governance review study for Area 'D'. Once the consultant has been selected, the public consultation process will get underway in the early autumn, under the capable guidance of the Committee Chair, Mr. Bob Daly.

Okanagan Falls Revitalization Project - Phase 2 ~ On July 2nd the RDOS Board approved a proposal for Phase 2 of the revitalization planning project for the Okanagan Falls Town Centre. During last year's initial phase, preliminary design options were developed by our consultants, Urban Forum Associates and Counterpoint Communications, in dialogue with the community. The work now moves to developing a more detailed town centre design plan, using a facilitated interactive workshop called a design "charrette". A charrette is a highly effective and integrative workshop in which design happens in real time. A wide range of considerations are discussed by a diverse group of stakeholders over a couple of days, facilitated by urban planning and design experts, and supported by a graphic arts team.

The Okanagan Falls town centre design charrette is being planned for Friday, September 18th and Saturday, September 19th at a location to be announced in next month's column. Although a certain number of participants will be specifically invited to ensure a good cross-section of stakeholder interests, a number of additional seats may be available to interested individuals who may chose to apply by contacting Denise Melenka at RDOS: dmelenka@rdos.bc.ca or 250-490-4215.

Car Show and Motor Bike Weekend ~ If you like classic and custom cars, keep in mind the third annual Okanagan Falls Car Show being held on Saturday, August 15th at Kenyon and Christie Memorial Parks (a "first" at the lakefront). And, don't forget the big Motor Bike Rally, hosted by the Okanagan Falls Hotel, also being held on the weekend of August 14th - 16th. As Parliamentary Secretary for Accessibility, I continue to focus on municipal and small-business initiatives that will raise awareness. As I have mentioned before, some communities, such as Sechelt, have active volunteer accessibility committees that are consulted by local governments when new or general maintenance work is being done on local infrastructure. Their job is to put a lens on a project that raises awareness of sight, hearing or mobility issues as it relates to access for all. We have an aging population that will benefit from an accessible-friendly community, and while we don't think about it much from a tourism perspective, there are many travellers who have mobility issues who are looking for accessible-friendly tourism opportunities. I encourage every community to engage its citizens in this worthwhile endeavour.

Congratulations to the Oliver Seniors Centre, which received a community gaming grant of \$25,000 to assist in participation in the BC Seniors Games.

Grand Forks recently received funds through the Build Canada Initiative to upgrade its wastewater treatment facility. The province contributed one-third (\$153,000) to this project that will see wastewater treated to a new cleaner standard before being discharged into the river. Clean water is a priority of our government and projects such as this are critically important to keeping our water safe. It is also great to see that Grand Forks City Hall has been restored after the fire damage and is back in use for the people of Grand Forks.

I recently met with Doug Zorn and the Grand Forks ATV Club to look at the improvements to trails, day use and camping in the Granby and Bluejoint areas that they are accomplishing with the help of a community and employer partnership through the Ministry of Social Development and Social Innovation. The program runs for 28 weeks and has put four individuals to work and is teaching them a set of skills and certification that they will be able to use for future employment. I was impressed with the care of the environment that the Grand Forks ATV Club demonstrates in its activities in this wilderness area. The sustainability of our forests is of prime concern to woodlot managers throughout the province. This is a family-supporting industry that manages areas of our forest in a way that preserves and protects wildlife, as well as the health of the forest itself. I want to thank George Delisle and the Boundary Woodlot Association for inviting me to their recent meeting and lunch hosted by Paul and Sue Adrian in Christina Lake, so that I could hear their concerns and needs for support around this industry. I attended the Collector Car Appreciation event in Keremeos on July 18th. This year, July 11th was declared Collector Car Appreciation Day and the Province of BC designates the entire month of July to this recognition. The organization held 216 events around BC last year and at every one of them there was a charitable component. In Keremeos, several cartloads of food were collected for the local food bank, and I want to thank everyone for their contributions to charities

Of interest to the South Okanagan will be a tour by the Royal BC Museum. In partnership with schools and museums, a mobile exhibit will be at the Oliver Museum the week of August 3rd and the Osoyoos Museum the week of August 10th. The exhibit in an eye-catching teardrop trailer will focus on species at risk with digital interactive displays providing innovative ways to educate people of all ages on species at risk. This is a pilot program for a three year project, and I encourage you to participate when the exhibit is in your community.

The Osoyoos Desert Society holds its annual fundraising event, Romancing the Desert, on August 8th. This is a unique way to experience a rare piece of our desert ecosystem and contribute to its preservation while enjoying good food and wine in a truly amazing setting. Sometimes events seem to all pile up on one day, and August 8th is one of those days. There is a Lavender Festival in Keremeos at Tree to Me; the official opening of the Border Town Winery in Osoyoos and the second annual Midsummer Night's Dream at Black Hills Winery in Oliver. The organizers of all these special events are to be commended for providing for locals and visitors alike an incredible variety of activities for us to enjoy.

Enough cannot be said about the fire danger to all of BC this season. While we in the South Okanagan, Similkameen and Boundary areas are not strangers to dry conditions, we all need to exercise extreme care if we are out enjoying our wild spaces. Understandably, the control of Mother Nature with lightning, etc., is outside our realm, but too many fires are human caused. We also have hundreds of homes on the fringe of our forested areas, and while communities like Anarchist Mountain are fire smart, many private-property owners have allowed flammable materials to accumulate around their homes, posing an even greater risk for fire. Please make an extra effort to be fire aware and have a fire escape plan for you and your family.

And finally, I encourage everyone to take time to be a tourist in your own town this summer.

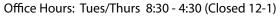
Water Conservation ~ With the long, dry hot spell that we have been having, it is important for each of us to reduce our water consumption. Adhering to the May 1st to September 30th watering restrictions for lawns and gardens is crucial. In addition, check our website at okanaganfallsirrgationdistrict.ca for water restriction information and for many water saving tips. Our staff are monitoring well levels on a daily basis.

Water Shut-Offs ~ Do you know where your water shut-off at the street is located? It is sometimes necessary for a homeowner to shut off water to his or her house in order to do plumbing work. In many cases, these valves have been covered during paving or landscaping, resulting in much frustration and expense for homeowners and the Irrigation District. Home owners are responsible for knowing where their shut-off valves are located. If you don't know, contact the Irrigation District Office, and we will do our best to help you.

**Promoting Local Businesses** ~ Well, another month has past us by and we have seen visitors from all over. We even have had some people in who are thinking about relocating to our beautiful little town. They are asking all kinds of questions ... what do we have to offer, things to do, what kind of stores do we have, etc. We direct them to our shelf unit in the centre that promotes Okanagan Falls and it's businesses. So, to all our businesses in town, if you want to be promoted please bring in your brochures and business cards.

We also promote our new bus system that now gets our residents to Penticton numerous times a day. And speaking of the bus, I would like to let the bus drivers know that your considerate driving by pulling over and letting the cars pass is greatly appreciated.

#### How did Skaha Lake get it's name?

- On Anderson Map 1867 it was called "L. du Chien" (Dog Lake).
- On Trutch Map 1866 & 1871 it was called "Du Chien L."
- On BC Map 1915 the official name was "Dog".
- On October 6, 1930, it was officially changed to "Skaha".
- However, the Okanagan First Nations say "Skaha" is not their word for 'dog', but for the Shuswap Tribes it is. The local word for 'dog' is "chokowapee" or another spelling is "kaekuwapa". In fact, the local meaning for Skaha Lake is actually "Horse Lake".

The maximum length of the lake is 7.3 miles. The maximum width is 1.4 miles. The lake covers 7.6 square miles, with an average depth 87 feet and a maximum depth 186 feet. There are beautiful beaches both ends of the lake, so get out there and enjoy the rest of the summer!



#### **KALEDEN PUBLIC NOTICE**

EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY ~ The Province of BC has requested all water users to voluntarily reduce their water consumption by 30%. The Okanagan Valley is at Level 3 Drought Status, and Level 4 is anticipated. Kaleden's water supply is in good shape, but communities are being asked by the Province to do whatever they can to reduce consumption, specifically those with licenses on surface water sources like ours (Skaha Lake). Although water levels of Skaha Lake seem unchanged, the Kaleden Irrigation District supports the Okanagan Basin Water Board in terms of "One Valley, One Water". The District currently has STAGE ONE water restrictions in place, watering is permitted from 6am to 10am and from 7pm to 11pm, STAGE TWO will be implemented if we cannot meet the requested reduction in consumption by the Province.

CONSERVATION ENFORCEMENT ~ Over the past few years, the District's approach to conservation has been that of an educational one, rather than strict enforcement. However, the Board of Trustees feel that the days of being lenient to violators of the District's policies are coming to an end. Currently, if you are found to be in violation of conservation measures, the District will issue a 24 hour notification of shut-off, and you will be charged a \$100 fee to have it turned back on. The Board requests that you contact the District office, or a trustee, anonymously if you notice any violators. AGRICULTURAL USERS (with Farm Status Designation): We ask that you water ONLY your crops, and not the landscaped areas of your property during the restricted times (10am to 7pm). If you require consultation or advice on how to reduce your water consumption, please visit our website at www.kaledenirrigation.com or contact the District office.

#### Governance Study For Electoral Area "D" Kicks Off

Cultural Development approved a governance study for Electoral Area "D" within the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen (RDOS). The purpose of the study is to review and consider methods of improvement of local governance in Electoral Area "D", which is a widespread region, encompassing the communities of Upper Carmi, Heritage Hills, Skaha Estates, Okanagan Falls, Kaleden and Apex and the surrounding areas.

The RDOS has appointed a Governance Study Committee made up of various individuals who live, work and invest in Electoral Area "D". The Committee, working with a consultant, is responsible for the management and oversight of the governance study process. Committee members are: Bob Daly - Chair, Doug Lychak, Tamara Browne, Leslie D'Andrea, Navid Chaudry, Larry Kenyon, Myleen Mallach, Gerry Stewart, Eleanor Walker, Sam Hancheroff, Tom Siddon (ex-officio), and Tom Styffe (ex-officio).

A Request for Proposals to retain the consultant was posted on July 9, 2015, and completion of the study is expected by Fall 2016.

The governance study places a great deal of importance on public consultation with one of the main goals to engage Area "D" residents and property owners in discussion about community issue and local governance. There will be considerable opportunity for Electoral Area "D" residents to provide input throughout the process.

The focus of this governance study is the consideration of improvement of governance and service options within the context of the Regional District, and should not be confused with an incorporation study.

On Thursday, July 16th, the RDOS Board formally approved the transfer of lands agreement with developer, Vintage Views Developments Ltd (Johnny Aantjes). The arrangement includes a donation by the developer of a portion of the lands, a purchase of a portion of the lands from the developer and a rent-to-purchase of a portion of the lands comprising the park.

The Executive Board of the Homeowner's Association would like to sincerely thank our Parks Committee, chaired by Ron Obirek, and those involved in the successful negotiations and conclusion of this transaction - Director Tom Siddon, CAO Bill Newell and his staff, and developer Johnny Aantjes.

Director Siddon supported the Association's request for a park from the very outset and has been instrumental in achieving Okanagan Parks & Recreation Commission and RDOS backing for the acquisition of this parkland.

Our Association has been working on getting a park for this neighbourhood for the last 5 years and now looks forward to working with the RDOS staff and the Parks & Recreation Commission on a long-term plan for development of the park. We have also worked with the Subdivision Approving Officer, Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure, to establish an emergency egress road through Vintage Views, which has now been accomplished as part of this subdivision plan approval.

Many residents have expressed interest in walking trails, a playing field, sports box, washrooms and considerably upgraded water feature. All of these and other thoughts and ideas will be considered when developing a plan for the park.

A park was promised to the purchasers of lots in this subdivision over 30 years ago and now, after 5 years of hard work and lobbying ... it is a reality!

Our hope is that this park becomes a focal point for enjoyment for all residents of Heritage Hills, Lakeshore Highlands and Vintage Views/ Chadwell Place. We look forward to existing and future members of our Association coming together in September at a meeting/celebration to help plan our park.

#### **Reduce Water Use By 30%**

In response to dry conditions, the BC Government extended its Drought Response Level 3 to include all the Okanagan as of Wednesday. July 15th, due to concerns

for fish stocks resulting from observed low stream flows and warming water temperatures. Additionally, angling has been suspended in all streams and rivers throughout the South Okanagan, which includes all streams and rivers in the Similkameen drainage.

What does "Level 3 Drought" mean? A Level 3 means conditions are becoming very dry. Potential serious ecosystem or socio-economic impacts are possible or imminent, or impacts already occurring. Emphasis continues to be on voluntary conservation but increased water restrictions may be imposed by water service providers.

What can we do to help? The RDOS is asking all residential, agricultural and commercial users of water across the District, on both private and public water systems, to reduce their overall water consumption by 30%. This voluntary reduction may prevent the need for further mandatory restrictions in the future.

Observe how much water you use in a day and then look for ways to reduce consumption. Make it a family, neighbourhood or personal challenge to reduce usage, make water work and re-use water creatively. We can make a difference and continue to have enough water for all. Residents can visit www.rdos.bc.ca/departments/public-works/water-systems/water-conservation/ for more conservation tips.

What is the RDOS doing in response to the Provincial statement? The RDOS is closely monitoring water usage in the public water systems operated by the RDOS and is observing an increase in consumption compared with the last 5 years of data. Also, the RDOS's Parks and Recreations Department has reduced irrigation usage in all of the RDOS parks by 30%.

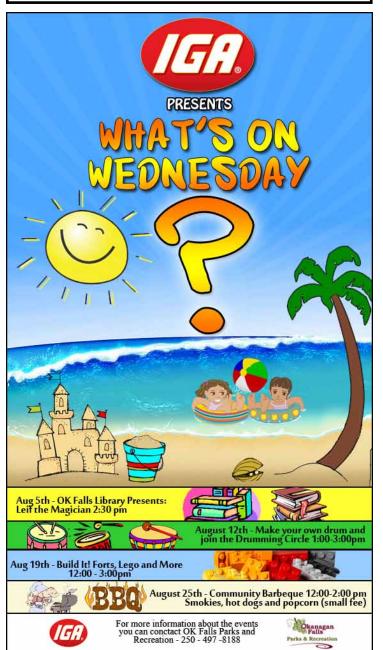

Once again, over the August long weekend, the South Okanagan and Similkameen will play host to one of North America's most challenging endurance events: Ultra520K Canada. The organizers of Ultra520K Canada would like to give notice to all the residents of the Kenyon Park area of Okanagan Falls that at the time and date above, 8th Avenue and Kenyon Park will be used as the Day 1 Finish Area for the Ultra520K Canada Triathlon Championships.

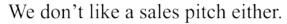

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#### Health Care in BC, can it be improved?

Much debate surrounds the question of which system of health care delivery best serves a community. With a wide variety of needs and expectations, the challenges to meet all of these needs is great. All health care providers feel the frustration at one time or another of trying to best help patients optimize health and diminish risks of illness within the confines of the system they work in. And, the Ministry of Health feels the frustration of trying to keep health care costs down to maintain a sustainable, lasting, quality medical system.

I have been putting much thought into this topic lately, because of the increasing frustration reported to me from patients who feel that their needs are not being met. Whether it is long wait times for specialist visits or procedures, or the lack of choice in health care options, the problem seems to be growing. After 20 years in practice, these issues are not new to me. In fact, I became a Naturopathic Physician for this very reason. It was obvious to me from the start that although in BC we are very fortunate to have a dedicated, modern, accessible health care system, it is not without flaws. Currently, the Ministry of Health has identified the main problems and is examining ways to better deliver quality health care to the citizens of BC. The Select Standing Committee on Health (SSCH) chaired by our local MLA Linda Larson, tasked with solving these issues, is reviewing submissions from concerned citizens and organizations, and will be developing recommendations to the Legislature for improvement in the health care delivery system in BC.

The goals of the committee and the Ministry of Health are valid and well intended; to lower health care costs and improve the health of British Columbians. The goals of Naturopathic Physicians are, and always have been the same; to lower health care costs and improve the health of all citizens. Yet, ironically, we are being largely ignored. NDs find and implement scientifically based methods of healing that are largely non-drug based. The SSCH has identified that over prescribing drugs is a major problem and that in BC we could avoid \$2 billion in health care spending annually by addressing this problem and focusing more on prevention. In fact, it has been identified that prescriptions for drugs rose 80% from 1999 to 2009. It has also been identified that the BC health care system is fragmented leading to an estimated 25% of the budget being wasted to inefficiencies. Naturopathic doctors are experts in evidence based, scientifically proven methods of prevention and the use of non-drug therapies, plus we believe strongly in integration of health care services (leading to less fragmentation). These methods are proven to both save money and improve the quality of life of patients.

I bring this to the publics' attention in an effort to inform you (the recipients of health care) about the processes that affect you all. You can make a submission outlining your concerns to the Select Standing Committee on Health and have your voice heard. It appears that the BC Ministry of Health is on the right track with identifying the key issues that trouble our health care system. Implementing change, however, is never simple. The more public input they receive regarding these issues the better fortified they will be to institute meaningful change.

I urge you to get involved and have your voice heard if you too wish to see positive change in our health care system. You can contact the SSCH and read the findings at:

**Insect Bites** ~ With summer in full swing, many of us are spending our days outdoors, bringing us in contact with different types of stinging and biting insects: bees, hornets, wasps, flies, mosquitos, spiders and increasingly, ticks.

Thankfully, most symptoms of insect bites are mild and localized and can be managed by promptly removing any stinger (by gentle sideways scraping motions, rather than grasping) and applying a cold compress for 15 minutes every hour for several hours to limit swelling. Thereafter, any continued swelling, persistent itch or redness can be treated with 0.5% hydrocortisone cream applied 3-4 times daily for several days, with or without oral antihistamines such as Benadryl. Pain or burning can be treated with oral pain killers such as Tylenol or Advil. Calamine or Pramoxine lotion may also be helpful to alleviate itch. Typically these bites heal within a week or two and its important to avoid repeated scratching, which can break skin resulting in delayed healing and can lead to secondary skin infections.

Sometimes, however, insect bites can produce more serious complications and require medical assessment. Living in the South Okanagan occasionally brings us in contact with the brown recluse spider whose bite is reported to produce tissue mortification and/or secondary infection and occasionally causes vomiting, muscle cramps, headache, fever and weakness. Likewise, ticks, which have been said to be increasing in number along the American border, occasionally carry and transmit Lyme disease, which can lead to serious long-term complications. The early stage of Lyme disease often produces a rash resembling a bullseye and the appearance of this rash warrants immediate medical

Fortunately, the most commonly encountered insect is often the least dangerous, with a few relatively exotic exceptions. Of course, I'm referring to the mosquito. Mosquito bites can be treated as described above and 25-30% DEET remains a safe and effective repellant for prevention. #### Reporting Crimes in your Neighborhood

Recently Supt Kevin Hewco and I attended community meetings in Kaleden and Okanagan Falls. The meetings were held to give the community an opportunity to discuss policing in their communities and to get an update from Supt Hewco in regards to crime trends and initiatives that were being implemented to address various trends and concerns. Certainly everyone would like to see more preventative patrols and police presence in their communities and it is certainly something that Supt Hewco and the Detachment is committed to do, based on resources and priorities. Those in attendance learned that the number of rural resources for policing their communities and others in the area around Penticton is not always sufficient to meet all demands for service. As such, police have to prioritize what and when they attend certain requests and calls. Unfortunately, the police cannot always attend every single request for service due to a variety of circumstances at any given time. However, this does not mean that you should not report crime or suspicious activities that occur in your neighborhood simply because you feel the police are too busy. or won't attend, or there is nothing they can do for you. Ultimately, the police need to know what crime is occurring and where and when it is occurring, so that we can better plan and implement strategies and/or enforcement to reduce and eliminate the crime. It may be that we need do some education, some enforcement, targeting or any combination to deal with the concerns, but we can only do this if we know about it in the first place. We employ a Crime Analyst at our Detachment for the region. This person reviews all reported crime and organizes it into types of crime, high crime areas, similar fact crimes, methods and suspects. This information is shared with other Detachment crime analysts as we all know criminals travel and this sharing of information helps us to develop profiles to track and catch those responsible. We have access to computer programs that can



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certainly assist us in cyber tracking and solving crimes, but it is all dependent on the information that the residents provide the police on crime, suspects and activities that are occurring in their communities. Crime Stoppers is a great way to report crime and suspicious activities if you want to remain anonymous, but want the police to know what is going on in your neighborhood. Any contact with Crime Stoppers via a phone call, a text tip or a web tip is all received anonymously by Crime Stoppers. Some people at the meeting thought that with "call display" that if they called Crime Stoppers their identity would be revealed in the call display and thus no longer would they be anonymous. As the coordinator of the South Okanagan Similkameen Crime Stoppers program, I know we do not use or subscribe to call display. Your calls, texts and web messages are routed anonymously to the appropriate Crime Stopper program and you are known only by the Tip number that is generated and given to you when you call Crime Stoppers with your information. I can reply back to you on text tips, but only through our anonymous server and I have no idea who I am talking with or the phone number I am replying to. Crime Stoppers goes to great lengths to ensure you remain anonymous, as that is what the program is based upon. So, if you want the police to be in a position to better serve and understand your concerns, you need to let us know what is happening in your neighborhood or to you. While at times police may not need to or be able to attend, the information will be recorded and your little bit of information when added to other bits of information could help solve a crime or issue that otherwise would not have been solved.

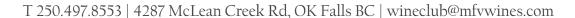

# Okanagan Falls Volunteer Fire Department BBQ Tip of the Month

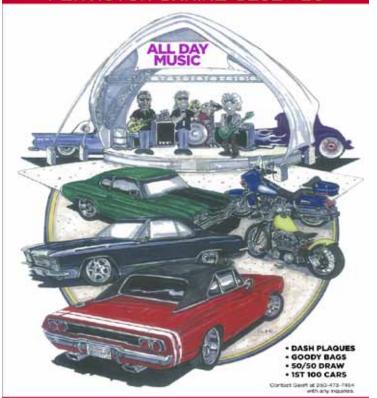


Check your barbecue to ensure that all propane connections are tight and in good working order. Always remember to turn off your tank when you are finished cooking. It is also advisable to not locate your

barbecue too close to any structure in case of fire. A barbecue on your deck should have a non-combustible pad underneath. And, always have an immediate water source (garden hose) handy. We are urging residents to use extreme caution with any heat source outdoors, due to dry summer conditions. Remember, no outdoor burning is permitted.

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#### Importance of Summer Reading

with Principal Lisa McCall of Okanagan Falls Elementary School

Research shows that kids who read four or more books over the summer are better prepared for the coming school year and do not go down the 'summer slide' - the loss of reading and learning skills during the summer break. It is my hope this article inspires you to bring literacy alive in your home! Reading over the summer months really does make a difference to your child's learning and as importantly can be a lot of fun for everyone! Here are some facts to support daily reading habits: Reading empowers critical thinking skills; Reading can enhance empathy and lead to greater understanding of people who are different from ourselves, and it can help us appreciate other points of view; Reading for pleasure is one of the building blocks needed for young people to grow into healthy, productive adults. The more children read they will develop fluency, vocabulary, comprehension, and literacy skills required to be mindful communicators. (Source California Library Assn). Most of all, reading is a lot of fun!

## Here are five easy ways you can help your child reduce summer reading loss:

- 1. Make reading important & relevant to everyday life. Be a role-model for reading. Let your child see you reading throughout the day and use daily routines as reading opportunities. Cooking, reading TV listings, looking for information on-line, reading directions, or following a map all provide authentic reading experiences. Remember, literacy involves a number of skills including listening, speaking, reading, writing, viewing and representing, so try and incorporate them into your everyday life. Literacy skills will also improve how we articulate and communicate with others.
- 2. Give your child the power of choice. Children who have easy access to books read more books. Having reading materials available is key to helping kids love to read and the reading materials kids choose themselves are best. In fact, 92% of children and teens say they are more motivated to read and are more likely to finish a book they have picked out. Help your child find texts that appeal to his or her interests, yet are age appropriate and 'just right' in difficulty. Gift cards for book stores for birthdays are a great way to allow your child to take time to peruse a book store and pick something of interest.
- 3. Set aside time to read every day. We know that the more kids read, the better they become at reading and the more they will enjoy reading. During the summer, encourage your child to read for at least 20 minutes per day. Make reading 'down-time' an opportunity for family members to read together, either aloud or quietly to themselves. Reading in a variety of interesting locations including outside, at the beach, in the car, or in the park. Keep track of progress by recording book titles, pages read, and minutes spent.
- 4. Talk it up. Talking about books during and after reading helps improve comprehension. Encourage kids to share their ideas and opinions by asking open-ended questions. Talk about what you read to let them know that reading is an important part of your life. Tell them why you liked a book, what you learned from it, or how it helped you soon they might start doing the same. Remember, early intervention research supports reading aloud to children at an early age is the most effective way to help them develop language skills and to communicate with the written word.
- 5. Be part of a reading challenge. Most local libraries have summer reading programs that help engage and motivate readers. Kids set a goal, track books they read, and receive incentives for achieving goals. Summer programs also promote reading club opportunities where children can discuss and share books with others, either on-line or in person. You can even create your own family reading challenge. Research tells us students who participated in the public library summer reading program had better reading skills at the end of third grade and scored higher on the standards test than the students who did not participate.

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#### **ONYX Castings Featured on HGTV**

On June 29th, Rob Martin, representing ONYX Castings, made his debut on national television on an episode of "Love It or List It".

Produced by Big Coat Productions of Toronto, the show is described as a prime-time reality series about homeowners faced with the toughest decisions of their life. Will they stay in their home or will they go? Each episode is filled with the stress of major renovations, the temptation of beautiful real estate, and the fierce rivalry between designer Hilary Farr and real estate agent David Visentin. In the end, the homeowners must decide if they "Love It" enough to stay or is it time to move and "List It"?

The show's producers approached The Concrete Countertop Institute (CCI) back in March about featuring concrete on an upcoming episode that was being filmed in Raleigh, NC. However, CCI is a training facility and is not capable of handling a project of that scope. So, Jeff Girard, founder of CCI sought to put together the "dream team" of former alumni. Founding partners Greg Robbins and Rob Martin both trained with Jeff at CCI and felt that participating was a rare opportunity. Over 20 applications were submitted and CCI chose three artisans that they felt had the most experience with Glass Fibre Reinforced Concrete (GFRC). ONYX Castings was the only Canadian business selected along with Rock Solid Concrete Artisans in Huntersville, NC and Arthouse Custom Concrete in Miamisburg, OH.

The designer and host of the show, Hilary Farr, wanted a natural grey for the countertop, a full height backsplash behind the sink and an end panel for the peninsula. The project, 80 square feet, was pretty typical of a kitchen remodel, but the timeline was very compressed due to the filming schedule of the show. The team templated on Wednesday, formed the molds on Thursday, cast on Friday, stripped and processed on Saturday and sealed on Sunday. Installation occurred the following Friday according to the schedules of the other trades.

Filming for the show occurred at the beginning of May and ONYX Castings wasn't able to publicize our participation until June 29th, the day the episode first aired on HGTV in the states and W Network and OWN in Canada. If you tuned in to watch, you know that Dave and Sonya "Loved It" and especially their kitchen countertops!

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#### **Pricing Your Home To Sell**

Imagine you want to buy a gallon of milk. You eye the dairy case, shelves stocked with dozens of choices, but they are really all the same. Milk is milk, and which one you select is really insignificant because they are all identical, and they are all priced the same.

But, what if each identical offering was priced differently? Odds are you have set aside ample time for your shopping trip, and you will carefully check the price labels and go for the best deal. Or, maybe you are drawn to the more attractive packaging.

When selling your home, attractive pricing and packaging are arguably the two most basic essentials. In our current real estate market, the buyers have a lot of choices. In many areas, the shelves are simply overstocked. And since no two homes are the same, making that distinction between your home and the dozens of others is key.

Where pricing is concerned, establishing that all important asking price is part science and part art, and there are several things you should consider.

- Study past sales ~ This is the starting point for any thoughtful
  and successful pricing strategy; think of it as the "science" part.
  Take the time to study past sale statistics for homes in your area
  and areas similar to yours. None will be identical, of course, but
  having a clear understanding of true market value is the first step
  in establishing your list price.
- Do not confuse active listings with past sales ~ Active listings have not sold. They are just your competition. It is important to be aware of your competition's pricing, but this is often just an indication of what your home won't sell for.
- Do not overprice, because you have "time" ~ If the market is appreciating, this strategy may work, but if prices in your area are declining, you may quickly find yourself chasing a market and costing yourself money. And, if the market is stable? Your home will just sit. Buyers pay in today's dollars, and time is rarely on your side.
- Leave some room for negotiation, but don't overreach ~ No seller wants to feel he left money on the table, and no buyer wants to overpay. Your price should give both parties room to maneuver, but if it is too high, you risk being perceived as unrealistic, and buyers will pass over your home.
- Think like a buyer ~ What are the things that you value in a home? Is it a large yard, an updated kitchen or a view? These are likely the same things that your buyer values as well. Talk to your agent about current buyer trends. Yesterday's avocado green shag carpeting is today's granite countertop. The property facing the interstate is going to be a tougher sell than the one with a mountain view. Your price should reflect how your home compares to the others offered for sale. Buyers will find objections to any home, as none is perfect, but it is curious how quickly objections disappear when the price is compelling.
- React swiftly and decisively ~ If your home is on the market and is not being shown or if you receive feedback that you are priced too aggressively, don't hesitate to adjust your price. Bad news, like spoiled milk, doesn't get better with time.

First impressions are everything when selling your home. Studies have shown that the first two weeks on the market are the most crucial to your success.

During these initial days, your home will be exposed to all active buyers. If your price is perceived as too high, you will quickly lose this initial audience and find yourself relying only on the trickle of new buyers entering the market each day.

Markets are dynamic, and your price has an expiration date. You have one chance to grab attention. Make sure your pricing helps you stand out on the shelf ... in a positive way.





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#### Warm Weather Requires Responsible Fishing

Area rivers are now closed to fishing, due to low flow and high water temperatures. For details on the regulations and current updates, visit www.env.gov.bc.ca/fw/fish/regulations/changes/1517/region8.html.

Area lakes are open; however, we should expect some exceptions to follow. Recreational Salmon fishing has been closed in several areas in fresh waters around the province and it is expected that the recreational Sockeye fishery in Osoyoos will not open or at the least be delayed until later this season.

As anglers, it is our responsibility to ensure we always check for in season regulation changes on the official sites. It is also our responsibility when fishing in lakes that are open to fishing to modify our fishing during high temperatures. High elevation lakes like Nickel Plate still have comfortable water temperatures. We should always limit the exposure of fish to the air that we intend to release, especially during high temperatures. In lower elevation level lakes that have high surface temperatures, we should stop fishing unless we intend to keep the fish. If keeping fish, be prepared and get them on ice as soon as caught. If you intend to release fish, don't overlook targeting species like Bass in Skaha Lake that have a broader tolerance for temperature than Trout or Kokanee.

#### Kaleden Museum ~ A History Tid Bit

with Meredith King



Developer James Ritchie

To understand how and why disaster struck James Ritchie and the Kaleden Development Company, we need to go back to the beginning. There was no one particular reason for the difficulties which threatened this small community, but was a combination of timing and events.

Kaleden was a huge undertaking and James Ritchie had borrowed heavily to develop it. In Summerland he had purchased and developed 320 acres. In Kaleden he attempted 3000 acres, and for that he needed alot more money than he had in his possession. He had gone

to London, England to procure funds and established the Kaleden Development Company. By 1912, one investor alone, Lord de Vesci, had invested \$150,000.

The irrigation system was the biggest investment in infrastructure and it had major cost overruns. Thousands of dollars had been spent to develop the elaborate system, a great deal more than anticipated had been poured into its construction. In addition, thousands more dollars were wasted in trying to bring water to Gillespie Flats. An expensive ditch digging machine was purchased and it proved to be utterly useless for this type of job. An additional \$75,000 loan at 10% interest was taken out before the extension to the Gillespie Ranch was abandoned. This loan provided temporary relief, but actually intensified the financial problems.

1913 was a hopeful year economically for Kaleden. The orchards were beginning to produce and the store, the hotel and the freighting businesses were booming. But, worldwide the prospects did not look so good. When 1913 ushered in a world wide recession, another loan for \$65,000 was required.

The beginning of World War I in 1914 was the final blow. Check in next month and find out why.
