FROM THE DIRECTOR

"At the going down of the sun and in the morning,



We will remember them!"

Laurence Binyon, 1914

As we reflect on these familiar words from Laurence Binyon's moving poem, "For the Fallen", we are reminded of the thousands of young Canadians who made the ultimate sacrifice over the past 100 years, in defense of our rights and freedoms as Canadians. One of the most compelling of these is the privilege of choosing how, and by whom, we are to be governed.

On October 19th, Canadians chose a new course and a return to some long-held

Liberal values by electing Justin Trudeau to serve as Canada's 23rd Prime Minister. My very best wishes go out to Prime Minister Trudeau and his newly-appointed Cabinet colleagues, as they begin to tackle the many formidable challenges which will confront our Nation during the days ahead, and in ways that will influence our respected reputation in the world for years to come.

At the same time, I want to extend my compliments to our newly elected Member of Parliament Mr. Richard Cannings, who will represent our constituency of South Okanagan-West Kootenay, sitting as a member of the New Democratic Party. Mr. Cannings is a highly qualified and well-respected gentleman, who will represent us well in the Parliament of Canada.

I also want to congratulate our former MP Dan Albas on his successful re-election as MP for the new constituency of Central Okanagan-Similkameen-Merritt. Thanks Dan to you and your Leader, the Rt. Hon. Stephen Harper, for serving us so diligently during the past several years.

Finally, I know you will all join me in expressing our gratitude to all those who offered their time and commitment to stand as candidates for office in the recent elections. It takes good candidates to make democracy work!

Now on to the business at hand in Area 'D'. At our local level of democracy in action, there are a number of significant public events planned during the weeks ahead.

Kaleden News ~ At the time of this writing, an important public information meeting was to be held at the Kaleden Community Hall on Thursday, October 29th from 5:00-7:30 pm. This event was hosted by Rogers Communications Ltd. to describe their proposed installation of an 18 metre (about 40 ft high) wireless communications tower on Greyledge rock, at a location roughly 200 metres northwest of the Kaleden Elementary School. Rogers is following a mandatory public consultation process as required by Industry Canada, with input from Health Canada and the RDOS. Residents who might have missed the meeting and have questions about the proposed tower should contact Chad Marlatt of Cypress Land Services at (855) 301-1520, or call Shona at our office: (778) 515-5520 for a detailed information package.

The Kaleden Recreation Commission and Kaleden Community Association have held several working sessions to prepare their proposed Budget projections for the coming year. As is their usual practice, Kal Rec will host an Open Public Meeting to discuss the budget proposals on Tuesday, November 3rd at 7 pm in the Kaleden Hall. I hope interested residents will come out to learn about the new budget items being proposed.

In recent weeks, Kaleden residents may have noted the bright reflective markings which have been added to the curbing on the Lakehill walkway. Work is also underway to resolve the storm drainage issues at the bottom of Lakehill Road. Lakefront park facilities have now

been winterized and plans are underway to get the new accessible washroom facilities up and operating before springtime.

Okanagan Falls News ~ The Okanagan Falls Parks and Recreation Commission have also been working on budget plans for the coming year. The recently acquired "Lamb" house on the shores of Skaha Lake has been upgraded and rented out on an interim basis, while the Parks Commission contemplates a range of park development possibilities for this waterfront property at the foot of Willow Street. Extension of the lakeshore pedestrian walkway through the "Lamb" property has been identified as a high priority by the Parks and Rec Commission.

Regarding the **Town Center Revitalization Project**, our planning consultants, Counterpoint Communications and Urban Forum Associates will be presenting their final report on the recent design charrette at an **Open Public Meeting on Monday, November 16th from 7-9 pm at the Okanagan Falls Seniors Centre**. You are invited to an interesting and informative evening where the consultants will present specific land use proposals and possible re-zoning options to facilitate the desired Town Centre Plan. Without an effective "implementation strategy" we will not be able to create a disciplined approach to the proposed future layout for the town centre.

My congratulations to Janet Black and her Age-Friendly Planning Committee on completion of the new concrete "accessible ramp" at the north end of the OK Falls Community Centre. This project was funded with a capital grant from New Horizons Canada, with construction assistance provided by School District #53. An official opening and "thank you" luncheon was hosted by the Age-Friendly Planning Committee at the Community Centre on Friday, October 16th.

OCP Progress for Area D-1 ~ The Citizen's Committee, Ecoplan Consultants and RDOS staff have been making great progress toward completing their report on proposed amendments to the Official Community Plan and zoning bylaws governing future land use on the west side of Area 'D'. 'D-1' is a vast area to the West of Skaha Lake, extending North from the White Lake basin through Twin Lakes and the Marron Valley to Green Mountain Road and Apex Mountain. Many important policy changes and technical improvements have been recommended to update the previous (1999) version of the OCP.

The OCP committee, with our staff and consultants, will host a presentation of the proposed OCP changes at a **Public Information Session at the Kaleden Elementary School on Wednesday, November 18th from 5-8 pm**. All interested residents of Area 'D-1' are invited to attend.

Skaha Estates/Kaleden Sewer Servicing Project ~ Now that the federal election is over, new funds are expected to become available for major infrastructure projects, especially those that offer significant environmental benefits. In fact, we just learned that a new round of Building Canada Infrastructure grants will be open for applications early in 2016. Therefore, I have called members of our Sewer Steering Committee to a special planning session at the OK Falls Community Centre on Saturday, November 14th from 9-11 am. If you have not received an invitation but would like to attend, please call Shona at the office: (778) 515-5520.

Well, that's it for this month. I hope to see many of you at the Remembrance Day Services which start at the Okanagan Falls Community Centre at 10 am on November 11th. After prayers, hymns and brief remarks, there will be a short march to the Cenotaph led by the 'Colour Party" for the 11 am "Last Post" and wreath laying. My compliments to the Okanagan Falls Canadian Legion Branch #227 for once again hosting this annual Service of Remembrance.

It's fall, and time to savour our agricultural riches

After a very long, dry summer we are still experiencing a relatively dry fall. There has been a bit of rain and cooling of temperatures, but I am, as many of you are, still concerned about our forests and what the next year could bring. Whether we like it or not, we should all be wishing for a lot of snow this winter.

Fall is an incredibly busy time for our mainly agricultural area. The abundance of the ground crop harvest greets us with piles of pumpkins and squash everywhere, and the smell of grapes being crushed reminds us of the huge success of the BC wine industry.

The Festival of the Grape held in Oliver on the first weekend in October brings together the greatest representation of wineries and grape growers in the province. This event has built on its successes year after year with a dedicated committee and wonderful volunteers. Congratulations to all for another successful event.

Keeping with the agricultural theme, in August the Harker family in Cawston received Canadian Food Hero recognition by Slow Food in Canada. Slow Food is an international organization with members in 150 countries whose mission is to recognize growers (or individuals) who promote good, clean and fair food by actively and positively contributing to a healthy food system.

Sara Harker was quick to acknowledge that the Harker family has a long history of producing organics in the Similkameen. They have been recognized provincially and nationally for their work in raising the profile and benefits of organic produce.

Small businesses are also celebrated in October and nominations are now being accepted to recognize those businesses who are exceptional. We all know the value of small businesses in our rural communities and the services they provide. The Registered Disability Savings Plan initiative has been very successful in BC. Hundreds of people who qualify have taken advantage of the RDSP and more than \$1 million has already been saved for the future of those with a disability.



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A special event will be held in October to recognize the hard work of the steering committee and some of the individuals who are participating in this program. Five-thousand Parent Advisory Councils around the province have received a share of \$135 million to use for the students in their schools. These volunteer committees of parents use these funds to add to the education of students by providing access to extracurricular activities that improve the school experience for all students. As with volunteers in all areas of community life, the value of PACs is immeasurable. Thank you to all the parents and guardians involved in this program.

As we move into November and the time of remembrance for all who have, or continue to be involved in our armed forces, a bright spot was enjoyed by the community of Oliver with the planting of 700 tulip bulbs in the Veterans Memorial Garden at the Oliver Cemetery. The bulbs were awarded to the Town of Oliver, as one of 140 communities in Canada to receive this gift in recognition of the involvement of Canadians in the liberation of Holland 70 years ago. Students from OES and SOSS along with veterans, family and friends took part in the planting. Special thanks to the Legion and Future Gardens for their work in organizing this special day.

In keeping with this theme, I would like to recognize Andy English and Jennifer Douglas from Hedley for the research work and organizing of the event in August to recognize the Hedley Boys - 17 men who, on Aug. 25, 1915, joined the Canadian Forces fighting in the First World War. The community of Hedley invited the descendants of those 17 to a special re-dedication of the Cenotaph exactly 100 years later on Aug. 25, 2015. The community continues its efforts to raise funds to refurbish the memorial to honour all veterans from Hedley who have lost their lives in the defence of democracy.

Please take a moment on November 11th to think about all those who have in the past and those who currently protect our freedoms.

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Look for an update on Deer Management, after an initial workshop in January 2015 which led to 22 recommendations presented by UBCM to the Province. The Province has responded and will provide funding to address urban deer management issues and tools. A South Okanagan Deer Committee has been established to further consult and propose projects for socially acceptable urban deer management solutions. Any project would require review and permitting by the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations, in accordance with the Wildlife Act.

A centrepiece of the Provincial Trails Strategy is the Kettle Valley / Columbia and Western Railway rail trails routes that form the basis of the Trans Canada Trail (TCT) through the Thompson Okanagan region. Thompson Okanagan Tourism Association (TOTA) in association with Destination BC, Recreation Sites and Trails BC, Trails BC, British Columbia Cycling Coalition and Cyclo Touring BC Program, is coordinating a Thompson Okanagan Regional Rail Trails Tourism Strategy. Watch for the unveiling of the Strategy, completion target is end of November. More information at www.totabc.org.

BC Parks is drafting a management plan for Skaha Bluffs and are looking for feedback. Please take the opportunity to comment on the draft management plan and express how you would like the park to be managed, this processes closes on November 30th. To residents and property owners in Apex, Heritage Hills/Lakeshore Highlands, Kaleden, Okanagan Falls, Skaha Estates, St. Andrews, Twin Lakes, Upper Carmi, Vaseux Lake, and surrounding areas.

Have you wondered what services the regional district provides or how decisions are made about those services? What the cost of services is and how to have your say in decisions affecting your local community? Over the next several months, the Area "D" Governance Study will provide you with answers to these questions, and offer opportunities for residents and property owners in the communities of Area "D" to share their perspectives: What's working? What's not? Why?

Ultimately, the Study will explore and propose options within the current regional district structure to improve the way in which Area "D" is governed and the way your local services are delivered.

The first step in the process will be for the Committee and the consultant engaged by the Committee to provide you with a series of summaries, or Fact Sheets, of the services the RDOS provides to the communities in Area "D". Each summary will explain the service, how it is delivered, how decisions are made, and what it costs.

By checking the RDOS Website and through successive articles in Skaha Matters and Apex Matters, you will find a series of Fact Sheets about governance and your local services including: Water; Fire and Emergency Services; Sewer; Solid Waste; Bylaw Enforcement; Planning and Building Inspection; Parks, Trails and Recreation; Library; Transit; and Electoral Area Governance. These Fact Sheets will also be available at convenient locations in your communities.

Early in 2016, and following the publication of all the Fact Sheets, the Governance Study Committee will be asking for your ideas on RDOS services and governance through your participation in the first of two surveys and a Governance Forum Open House and Roundtable Discussion. Watch for posters and advertisements in the New Year.

If you will be away for all or part of the winter and want to stay involved with the Governance Study, you can participate, including with the surveys, by regularly checking the RDOS Area D Government Study webpage under "popular links" at www.rdos.bc.ca. Also, continue to read Skaha Matters and Apex Matters online for current information.

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Winter Tires - Get a Grip

So far, the great weather has been hanging on in the Okanagan Valley, but we all know that winter is right around the corner and can strike at any time, especially in the mountain passes.

It is also the time of year when many people ask, "Do I really need winter tires?" And, the answer is YES. Here is why: Rubber tends to harden in cold weather, thus reducing friction and stopping capability of the vehicle. The new generation of winter tires maintain their elasticity and gripping power at lower temperatures (-35°C and below), whereas all season tires tend to stiffen and lose gripping power around 0°C. The improved gripping power translates to shorter stopping distances and better vehicle cornering and control. That could be the difference between a safe stop and a fender bender or worse.

Another frequently asked question ... "Are all season tires considered to be winter tires?" The answer is NO. Winter tires will have a symbol of a mountain peak with a snow flake. Tires marked with the letters M + S, or mud and snow, often found on SUV / pickup tires, may provide safe all-weather condition, and are considered a winter tire, but are not always suitable for severe snow conditions. Consumers should research their tire options and make an informed decision that may save lives on an icy road.

BC Law ... What is a winter tire? - Motor Vehicle Act Section 208

- For the purpose of this section, "winter tire" means a tire that is:
 - a)advertised or represented by its manufacturer or a person in the business of selling tires to be a tire intended principally for winter use, and that provides, or is designed to provide, adequate traction in snow or mud; and
 - b)in the condition respecting tread wear and other particulars the regulations prescribe.
- The minister responsible for the administration of the Transportation Act may, by public notice or by placing signs, prohibit vehicles from being driven or operated on a highway that are not equipped with chains, winter tires or sanding devices, or a combination of these the minister considers adequate and necessary in view of prevailing road conditions.
- For the purposes of a prosecution under this section, the onus is on the defendant to prove that a tire alleged not to be a winter tire is in fact a winter tire.

When Should You Install Winter Tires and/or Carry Tire Chains?

British Columbia's climate ranges from freezing cold to pleasantly mild in the winter. Equipping your vehicle appropriately depends on what you are driving and where you are driving. Most BC highways require passenger vehicles to use M+S or Mountain/Snowflake tires, and commercial vehicles to carry chains between October 1st and March 31st (new dates this year). The roads in the Okanagan Valley bottom, as well as the mountain passes, are now included in this requirement. Visit www.drivebc.ca for more information on winter tires, winter driving and the designated Winter Tire and Chain-Up Route maps. There are very few sections of highways in British Columbia (select locations along southern coast) that do not require winter tires or chains during the winter.

Now is time to get your vehicle ready for winter ... Don't wait until the snow starts falling to equip your vehicle with a proper set of tires. Learn and practice winter driving techniques before you need them. SLOW DOWN and WEAR your seatbelt .

What Is Iyengar Style Yoga?

Yoga has become very accessible over the last decade. Many people, of all ages and abilities have found a class, teacher, studio space and style of Yoga they really enjoy and through practice, receive great physical and emotional benefits. How does one sort out all the different styles? Start by asking friends that are already attending a class, talk directly to the instructor or program coordinator, and as always in our age of technology - do some research on the internet. And for today, read on!

Get Bent runs classes seven days a week in Penticton, as well as Chair Yoga classes at the Kaleden Community Church (Mondays 1:30 to 2:30 pm until December 14th), which brings us to the lyengar style. Developed by practitioner, Yogacharya B.K.S. lyengar, these classes focus on alignment. The idea is that poses are possible for everybody, because it's not necessarily about "the pose", rather the benefit one can receive from the alignment. There can be several people in one class, all working on the same alignment, but each doing a different variation, as each body is unique. An example would be sitting with legs straight in front and touching your toes. For some - no problem. For others not happening. Some people may sit and have a strap around their feet and in each hand (like reigns on a horse) if they can't reach their toes. Others may sit in a chair with a leg up. These three variations are all of the same pose, the benefit bringing length to the back of the legs (hamstrings and calves).

The Kaleden Chair Yoga classes are based on this, and allow for safe and comfortable poses that are easy to understand. Iyengar style Yoga is meant to accommodate and take into account each body's needs, tension, injuries and habitual posture. The mental exercise of focusing directly on specific points, in order to gain a deeper understanding of one's body is a powerful step in creating self awareness and a stronger mind body connection.

What is Chelation?

I am often asked - What exactly is Chelation therapy? To answer this question, the following article will explain the basics of this therapy and how it may benefit your health. To *Chelate* means to remove unwanted toxic metals and mineral from the body. This is accomplished with various Chelating agents that can be administered in either a pill form or through intravenous therapy. Research to date supports the use of *intravenous chelation* as the most effective and safest method of detoxifying body heavy metal burden. It may


take 10 or more treatments to remove toxic metals such as lead, mercury, arsenic, aluminium, cadmium, nickel, and tin. With proper testing, almost everyone today is found to carry some level of toxic metal load in their bodies.

Some people naturally detoxify more effectively than others. And, it has been determined that many chronic illnesses are associated with heavy metal toxicity (likely more prevalent in those who do not naturally detoxify metals easily). In particular Autism, Alzheimer's disease and other neurological diseases, cardiovascular disease, kidney disease, and possibly cancer (to name a few), may be associated with metal toxicity. A recent study from the University of Michigan found that "exposure to mercury stood out as the main risk factor or autoimmunity". (Environ Health Perspect; DOI:10.1289/ehp.1408751 Mercury Exposure and Antinuclear Antibodies among Females of Reproductive Age in the United States: NHANES Emily C. Somers,1,2,3 Martha A. Ganser,1 Jeffrey S. Warren,4 Niladri Basu,2,5 Lu Wang,6 Suzanna M. Zick,7 and Sung Kyun Park2)

Mercury is particularly toxic to the entire body, but has been specifically identified as a neurotoxin, kidney toxin, and immune system toxin. There are no safe levels of this metal in the human body. We accumulate mercury from dental amalgams, contaminated seafood, fungicides, pesticides, batteries, cosmetics, coal mining emissions, and many other industrial sources.

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Historically, Chelation was first administered by intravenous infusion around World War II as a poison gas antidote and to remove lead from the bodies of industrial workers. It was observed that many of the patients who received Chelation therapy also had general health improvements and in particular had improved blood flow dynamics. Symptoms such as angina, intermittent claudication (leg pain with walking), poor memory, eye sight and hearing, all improved with this therapy. Research since this time has consistently shown improvement in cardiovascular disease symptoms and a reduction in the risk of heart attack and stroke. A recent NIH (National Institute of Health) clinical trial in the U.S. (the TACT trial) showed an overall 18% reduction in clinical events, such as heart attacks and strokes in patients who had previous cardiovascular disease. These numbers were even better in a sub-group of Diabetic patients in which the clinical events were reduced by 39%. This was based on a total of 40 intravenous chelation treatments. These infusions last 90 minutes to 3 hours each and are administered from 1-3 times weekly.

Chelation is a medical therapy that is effective for both toxic metal removal and cardiovascular disease prevention. It is administered by Physicians with specialized training in this area and in BC is approved for use by the College of Naturopathic Physicians of BC under the Ministry of Health. Doctors who offer Chelation therapy have advanced training and certification in this area. It is not a stand-alone therapy and works best when accompanied by a holistic approach addressing lifestyle factors such as exercise, diet, nutraceutical supplementation, and stress management. Naturopathic Physicians are the trained and experienced physicians in lifestyle approaches to health and wellness. Influenza and Pneumonia Vaccinations ~

With the colder temperatures coming, many people have been asking about the availability of publicly funded flu shots, which are distributed annually by Interior Health to community providers, including pharmacies, typically beginning in late October. Currently, the 2015/16 vaccination campaign is slated to begin November 2nd, although many individuals prefer to receive their shots a little earlier.

Vaccination is available FREE to eligible individuals including adults aged 65 and older; women at any stage of pregnancy; individuals of all ages with chronic diseases of the lung such as asthma, COPD, cystic fibrosis; individuals with diabetes, heart disease, kidney disease, liver disease and anemia; individuals with cancer and those taking medications that lower immunity; residents of assisted living or care homes; and healthcare workers and first responders. Anyone considered a household contact of the above individuals also qualifies. So basically, its pretty difficult to find someone who doesn't qualify for a free flu shot!

If you or someone you know are eligible for vaccination, or are unsure about your eligibility and have questions about influenza and pneumonia, please call us or drop by and we will be happy to assist you.

In closing, while the flu shot is an effective way to reduce the risk of hospitalization from influenza, its not 100% effective and if you are unlucky enough to be stricken with the flu, plenty of fluids, bed rest and Tylenol for headache, fever, sore throat and muscle ache remain the best supportive measures to help you feel better. Here's hoping you are flu-free this season!

Learning Forum: Positive feedback was received for our recent learning forum where school teams presented their goals and plans for student learning and success, as well as to how these goals were supported by their school inquiry work. It was an effective way to see the district at a glance, as far as the alignment of goals supporting the

district vision. Schools are focusing on student engagement, social and emotional learning, academic achievement and quality teaching and learning. Our next learning forum will take place on Wednesday, November 4th at 7:00 pm at Tuc-el-Nuit Elementary School on the topic of e-portfolios to engage parents and students in the assessment of student progress. This is open to all parents and staff of the district, as this strategy is being explored by other schools and teachers in the district.

In the first year, all schools have established a format and process for engaging in team inquiry and all schools have scanned their evidence and student needs to establish inquiry questions.

Our overall vision and goal of inquiry is to create a systemic culture of inquiry across the district, including classrooms of inquiry to build capacity, our working knowledge, and our district vision and school plans to more effectively align our energy and resources.

At **Okanagan Falls Elementary**, we will have early dismissal on the last Wednesday of every month from now through May 2016.

Highlights of the 2014/15 financial statements include the following:

- Total Operating Deficit for the year was \$693,741, leaving us with an Operating Surplus of \$1,431,236.
- A restricted operating surplus of \$1.43 million is committed to funding specific expenditures in 2015/16 and general expenditures approved by the Board of for the 2015/16 budget.
- Special Purpose funds include funds received from the Ministry of Education or other sources that have been designated for specific purposes.
- During 2014/15 grants from the Ministry of Education by bylaw capital projects totaled \$506,430. During 2014/15, \$699,392 was spent on capital projects, including various additions to Similkameen Elementary Secondary and Cawston Primary School buildings.

School Trustee Report for SD67

Queen's Park teacher, Nicole MacIntyre, organized the HUB Summer Library for a second year. For some children in the Queen's Park neighbourhood the public library is not accessible, so she decided to organize and host library time under the trees at the school. The 'library' was open two days per week with 80 children/adults attending over the summer. The students were provided with book bags and could take books home if they wished - all the books were returned.

"Through A Different Lens" is a district initiative that looks at alternative ways of instruction and assessment with a focus on strength-based learning. The project began five years ago as a small group of hardworking, dedicated educators looking for a better way to connect with students at risk of not completing their education and has grown to include educators from 12 district schools. Four years ago the project was the recipient of a three year \$150,000 grant from the Vancouver Foundation which went a long way to sustaining the program. The Foundation has once again seen its value and awarded another three-year \$150,000 grant.

As of September 30th, the enrollment is 5661, which is a decline of 38 students from September 2014 (5699 students). This number is a head count and includes international and fee-paying students, but not home schoolers. The Kindergarten numbers are down 22 students from 378 in September 2014 to 356.

As of June 30, 2015 the district is showing a surplus of \$349,329 in unrestricted funds. The large amount of the surplus is primarily due to the late start in the 2014/15 school year. The Board decided to move \$250,000 into a contingency fund and leave the remainder unrestricted for emergent situations.

The Ministry of Education recently announced \$1,000,000, over two years, to train 2000 teachers around the province to use the new curriculum. Those teachers will then mentor the educators in their home districts. There will also be a re-allotment of 10 hours of instructional time to accommodate the professional development in the districts, which may mean an additional Pro-D Day added to the calendar. At this time, there are no other details available.

The district has updated the Long Range Facilities Plan Report. This report looks at the capacity of each facility, current enrollment and projections, current and potential facility use and outlines the financial challenges ahead. Two meetings were held in October, initially to roll out the report and then to look at opportunities and potential options. There will be more public meetings over the next couple of months. The dates for these meetings will be announced on the website and through the media. Please, come and be part of the conversation. More information is available at sd67.bc.ca

Kaleden Museum ~ A History Tid Bit

with Meredith King

Though the war years were tough for the citizens of Kaleden, through hard work and cooperation the orchards owned by the families continued to grow and produce.

In 1914, during the first year of the war, the first crop of apples were harvested by Harry Corbitt. He made up the boxes in the Sandy Cameron building and Happy Potter, a Penticton Fruit Union man, was brought in to pack the 129 boxes of Jonathon apples. They were shipped to Penticton on the Mallard.

Apricots were the first fruit to become commercially important and in 1915 and 1916 Western Canners took most of the Kaleden crop. George Robertson and Jud Findlay hauled the fruit to Penticton in wagons fitted with bolster springs. The remainder of the crop was purchased by the Penticton Fruit Union. They hauled it loose to Penticton for packing in 1915 and sent a Miss Warren down to Kaleden to supervise the packing the following year. In the meantime, Muir Steuart, from the Summerland packing house, arrived on the scene to compete for produce. In 1916, he obtained a small portion of the local tonnage and hauled it to Summerland for packing.

In 1917, a number things changed. As the local tonnage grew, so did the competition. The Penticton Fruit Union became the Penticton Co-operative Growers and they set up operations in the Lapsley shed on the Kaleden wharf and then when the weather grew colder, moved to the basement of the closed Hotel. Nelson Menzies was sent from Penticton to oversee the packing.

Muir Steuart, in a bold move to secure more stock, built the first packing house where the Community Hall now stands. He hired Fred Graham as manager who remained until Steuart sold out.

By 1918, Kaleden had become the largest producer of apricots in the valley and the apple crop that year had risen to 4200 packed boxes, so the tonnage was in fierce demand.

The Penticton Co-op, in an effort to meet the competition, moved their packing operations up the hill to two large tents across Linden Avenue from the Steuart packing house. They survived 1918, but it was to no avail. By 1919, Muir Steuart, with the advantage of a site, a building and permanent equipment, had cornered most of the tonnage and the Penticton Co-op packed up and went home. Muir Steuart continued as the dominant fruit handler until 1922 when he sold out, lock, stock and barrel to the Penticton Co-op.
