

Penticton RCMP are reminding residents that school is now back in session and with that comes School Zones and School Buses. The Penticton RCMP will be monitoring school zones for speeders and persons parking in no stopping zones to unload or load their children. The No Stopping Zones are just that ... No Stopping Zones. They are there to provide visibility and a buffer zone for children entering and leaving school. People are reminded that it is also a Motor Vehicle Act Offence for vehicles to pass a school bus in either direction when the bus is stopped and warning signals are activated while children are loading or unloading. Vehicles following and approaching a school bus with its signals activated must stop until the bus driver shuts off the signals to indicate it is now safe to proceed. As in previous years, Penticton RCMP members will be occasionally riding school buses to identify and ticket drivers that fail to stop for a school bus. The fine is \$167.00. There has been a recent increase in property thefts in the rural areas. Penticton RCMP and RCMP in the South Okanagan have increased resources to investigate these thefts and as of Wednesday, September

23rd had arrested two males responsible for a combined total of 40 property thefts in the area. The RCMP are continuing to investigate area property crimes in hopes of more arrests and charges.

In order to further reduce property crime, RCMP ask that rural residents to not be complacent when it comes to securing their rural homes and property. Often rural residents get a false sense of security in that they feel in their rural location they are less likely to be a victim of property crimes than an urban resident. In fact, rural areas can be even more susceptible when residents are away as they often do not have neighbours nearby that can watch their property and report suspicious activities. This provides thieves with a very good environment in which to ply their trade in that the chances of them being seen, caught in the act and apprehended are low. Residents need to secure their property as best as they can, don't leave keys in vehicles, equipment and ATVs. Don't leave off road vehicles such as ATVs, dirt bikes, snow mobiles on unsecured trailers. When you go away, even for the day, secure your home and give it the appearance that somebody is home, such as leaving lights on controlled by timers, and/or leaving a radio on. If you are going to be away for a period of time, consider an alarm system and the very least have someone regularly check on your property. Alarm systems and security cameras have become very affordable and some systems can be controlled and monitored by your smart phone even when away from home. Elect Alan Whitman Area D Director To Stop Incorporation

Incorporation Will Mean Much Higher Property Taxes and Worse Road Maintenance

Director Siddon has asked the province to study the incorporation of South Skaha, a proposal which would join the communities of Heritage Hills, Lakeshore Highlands, Skaha Estates, Okanagan Falls, Vaseux Lake, Kaleden, and St. Andrews together into one spread-out town. The province currently maintains our roads and, while we do have our share of potholes, there are far more potholes on the main streets of Penticton year around. How could the large, thinly populated proposed town of South Skaha possibly afford to maintain our streets and rural roads as well as the compact and densely populated city of Penticton can? When you drive along Eastside Road in winter you always know when you have reached the Penticton city limits - there is far more ice and slush on the main streets of Penticton than we have on our roads, currently maintained by the province.

The new town would need to hire five department heads and their staff at high salaries, instead of having the cost of those salaries spread across the entire RDOS as they are now. The only South Skaha residents who will benefit from incorporation will be the new mayor and councillors.

Twice Okanagan Falls wisely voted against incorporation in referendums. On October 16, 2013 Director Siddon asked for a show of hands at a Town Hall Meeting. About 60 percent of those present were opposed to an incorporation study, but he still proceeded with his incorporation agenda. Much as I like and respect Tom Siddon, I believe that the purpose of public meetings is to learn the will of the residents and to listen to their joint wisdom. Director Siddon has repeatedly lobbied the Minister of Community, Sport and Cultural Development to begin an incorporation study. What he has not told you is that the province will be in charge of which direction the study goes, not the RDOS director. The province can do whatever it wants where municipalities are concerned, just as it did in 1973 when it forced Rutland and Okanagan Mission to become part of Kelowna without holding a referendum. (The province also did this to the suburbs of Kamloops, Prince George, and Nanaimo). The province does not have to hold a referendum if it decides to create Director Siddon's proposed town of South Skaha by legislation. But you have the opportunity to vote on incorporation now, at this election. If elected, I will tell the Minister that preventing incorporation was the election question.

Don't Bite the Hand That Feeds You!

Municipalities and Regional Districts do not have the financial resources to build major infrastructure projects like the sewer extensions to Kaleden and Skaha Estates by themselves. They have to apply for infrastructure grants from the provincial and federal governments. That is why regional district directors and town councillors keep their opinions about federal and provincial politics to themselves, so that they can work with whichever party is in power at the two senior levels of government. But Director Siddon has lambasted the federal government many times in the national media, including appearing frequently on the CBC TV national news. Regardless of whether you agree with Director Siddon's strong criticisms of the federal government or not, and regardless of whether you vote Conservative, Liberal, NDP, or Green, you must realize that Director Siddon's many attacks on the federal government have ensured that there will not be any federal infrastructure grants given to RDOS Area D while he is the director. Don't bite the hand that feeds you!



Upper Carmi said years ago that they want fire protection. They deserve to have a feasibility study. Fire protection would make their insurance premiums much less.

Heritage Hills and Lakeshore Highlands do not have any park, not even a playground. This is far overdue. Let's get this done!

Skaha Estates and lower **Kaleden** want sewer service extended to them. This will require infrastructure grants from the federal and provincial governments.

Okanagan Falls will enjoy lower sewer rates when service is extended to Skaha Estates and Kaleden. I am in favour of some of the revitalization concept for downtown Okanagan Falls, but only if residential property taxes are not used to pay for it. The idea of a Wine Centre focal point is an excellent one; but the consultant's recommendation for a one-way couplet on 7th and 8th Avenues is premature -- common sense says that you don't make one-way streets before the traffic volume requires it. To attract tourists we need signage on Highway 97 indicating that our beaches have very shallow water and so are more suitable for children than most beaches are.

Kaleden's sidewalk on Lakehill Road is a priority, as is the protection of undeveloped riparian areas on Skaha Lake.

The oversubscribed aguifer at **Twin Lakes** must be protected.

There still isn't a garbage transfer station at **Apex**. How many years does it take to build what amounts to a giant garbage can? The entire Alaska Highway was built faster!

As Officer-in-Charge of the Prince George Weather Office, I was always careful with taxpayer's dollars. When I was assigned to build a new weather office, I completed the office and its specialized equipment for only 28 percent of budget and a year ahead of schedule. If elected, I will never claim any travel expenses.

Gretchen and Alan have two adult children. After retiring to Skaha Estates, Alan became a freelance author, and Sky & Telescope Magazine recently made him a Contributing Editor. He has served on the executive of most clubs that he has joined, and was on the National Council of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada for over a decade. He also served as a Skaha Estates Improvement District (SEID) trustee for seven years. (SEID manages our water system and park.) In the last year, Alan has listened to your concerns at community meetings held in Twin Lakes, Kaleden (several meetings), Okanagan Falls (several), Skaha Estates, Heritage Hills/Lakeshore Highlands, and Apex (where he is a season pass holder).

Elect Alan Whitman to stop incorporation and the higher property taxes and poorer road maintenance that would result. Let's put Tom Siddon's incorporation genie back in the bottle, while we in South Skaha still can!

From 26th October onwards, the world will be getting just that little bit smaller for residents and businesses

in the South Okanagan and Similkameen Valleys. WestJet is coming to town! Direct daily flights from Penticton to Calgary and a plethora of connections from Calgary to worldwide destinations will now be at our finger tips!

While this new service is undoubtedly fantastic for the economy of our region, none of us should be under the illusion that WestJet will remain in Penticton indefinitely if the service does not prove to be viable. It is therefore up to all of us to actively support this service and help spread the word amongst friends, family and colleagues in the area, in Alberta and overseas.

Establishing an eastbound daily service to Calgary has been a long-held dream of many people in our region. Finally getting this service to such a lucrative destination will give the economy of our region a much needed boost. Based on statistics from other BC communities where WestJet Encore has entered the market, South Okanagan businesses can expect to see their average travel costs reduced by 25-30%. This is due in part to increases in competition and reduced travel times and costs associated with getting to airports further afield. Statistics also indicate that these communities can expect to get 50-70% more connecting flight options as new destinations are opened-up. From Calgary, connections are available daily to Vancouver, Victoria, Edmonton, Grand Prairie, Regina, Saskatoon, Winnipeg, Hamilton, Toronto, Ottawa, Halifax and Las Vegas. There are also numerous direct connections to destinations around the world.

It is worth pointing out that our long-standing and much valued relationship with Air Canada will remain. Their regular services between Penticton and Vancouver will be unaffected.

Important Message to the Residents of Skaha Estates!

Skaha Estates Improvement District is about to have major repairs done to its #1 reservoir. Repairs will be done to the inside and outside of the reservoir. From October 15th to October 18th the reservoir will have to be emptied to facilitate the repairs to the inside. During this time, the water system will be run on direct pump pressure with no reserve water. This means there will be limited water supply to your homes.

We ask that all homeowners <u>do not water outside</u>, as it could affect water supply to homes in the higher pressure area; namely Sunny Bay Road and Panorama Crescent. We do not anticipate any problems, as long as everyone cooperates with our request.

When the reservoir is brought back online, one might experience a little higher taste and smell of chlorine. This is expected as everything will be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.

Okanagan Falls Irrigation District News

September was a particularly busy and productive month for Trustees and Staff of Okanagan Falls Irrigation District.

As a result of July's Boil Water Advisory, the Board has held a succession of meetings with Interior Health personnel. To date, the Board has reviewed and amended its Emergency Response Plan, particularly with regard to the protocols with Interior Health and in communicating with the public. The Board has also upgraded its water sampling procedures to ensure samples are free from external contamination and that sampling tests the entire system.

Another project the Board and Staff have completed is a review and revision to the fire hydrant service procedures. This will see that the Board is in compliance with fire code regulations and most importantly that the hydrants are in working order when required.

As part of the Board's planning objective for 2014, the Irrigation District contracted for an audit of its operation. Bob Hrasko of Agua Consulting of Kelowna met with Trustees and Staff to get a thorough look at the system in order to let us know what parts of the operation are working well and what parts may be in need of attention. This was an initiative of the Board in order to get an objective look and to help set priorities for improvement. We expect the report sometime in October and will share the results with you.

When the Community Band Shell Committee began work to create a band shell for Okanagan Falls Irrigation District's Centennial Park several years ago, the Board made a commitment to assist the project, as the band shell will become an asset of the Irrigation District as well as to the community. As the fundraising for the project has neared its goal, the Irrigation District will be stepping up with a donation of \$5000, so that the construction can soon begin.

September 30th marks the end of watering restrictions for this year. On behalf of the Board and Staff, thank you for your help in reducing water consumption over a very hot and dry summer.





Fire Prevention Week October 5-11, 2014

"Working Smoke Alarms save Lives, Test Yours Every Month!!"

Smoke alarms have become such a common feature of most households that they're often taken for granted, and aren't tested and maintained as they should. However, working smoke alarms are a critical fire safety tool that can mean the difference between life and death in a home fire.

Smoke Alarm Tips:

- Install smoke alarms outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement.
- Interconnect all smoke alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Test alarms each MONTH by pushing the test button.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or sooner if they do not respond properly.
- Make sure everyone in the home knows the sound and understands what to do when they hear the smoke alarm. Try testing your alarm when your children are sleeping and see if they respond.

"Got Bats?"

with Margaret Holm, Okanagan Community Bat Coordinator

The Okanagan Community Bat Program is a new initiative to support bat conservation in the Okanagan by providing information about bats and getting the public's assistance with locating and monitoring bat roosts. Residents can ask questions about health and safety concerns, get information on attracting bats and learn about options for dealing with bats in buildings. Contact the Community Bat Program through okanagan@bcbats.ca, the web site www.bcbats.ca or leave a message for the Okanagan Coordinator, Margaret Holm, at 1-855-922-2287.

Six out of fourteen species of bats that live in the Okanagan inhabit buildings. During June through August, young bat pups are born, feed and learn to fly. By September many bats begin to leave their summer roosts and by the end of October, most bats have left for the winter.

Late fall and winter is the ideal time to make home repairs if bats are to be excluded from buildings. Holm has suggestions on sealing up areas that are access spots for bats, but warns that the bats must not be present. One-way flaps can be installed that allow bats to safely exit buildings, but prevents them from getting inside again.

If the bats are using an attic, barn or storage shed, many people are happy to co-exist with bats and benefit from the insect control that bats provide. Some people have lived with bats in their attic for decades, since they do not come into contact with them. In other cases, where bats find ways into human living spaces or guano cannot be regularly cleaned out, exclusion may be the best option. Homeowners are encouraged to install bat boxes in cases where bats are being excluded from buildings, since bats play an important role foraging on flying insects including agricultural pests.





School Trustee Report for SD67

The Penticton Tennis Club is seeking property to set up a replacement indoor tennis facility (tennis bubble). They approached the Board regarding the use of an empty piece of land adjacent to West Bench School, which is currently a bus turnaround and overflow parking area. Ken Naylor, President of the Penticton Tennis Club, also suggested there might be an opportunity for a Tennis Academy similar to the Okanagan Hockey Academy. The Board asked to have the particulars and building specs forwarded to the Secretary Treasurer for review.

Jonathon McGraw, of BDO Dunwoody, has completed the annual audit of the School District accounts and reported that they are in excellent shape and he has no concerns.

At the September Board meeting, the Secretary Treasurer reported that there are unspent funds from the 2013/14 budget. These funds will be used for a variety of one-time in-school projects.

Through careful management practices, the district has seen Worksafe BC rates reduced from \$0.64 to \$0.54 per \$100,000, which will save the district a considerable amount of money over the next year.

The Board has approved a new policy for circulation and comments. Policy 580 Whistleblower Protection is up on the website for comment. After many hours of negotiation, a six-year tentative collective agreement between the BCPSEA and the BCTF was reached in the early morning of September 17th. The collective agreement was ratified by the BCTF on Thursday, September 18th and by Boards of Education on Friday, September 19th. It takes effect immediately.

Over the summer, SD67 trustees wrote two letters to BCPSEA, BCTF and the Minister of Education, copying to MLA's and the Premier, asking for a negotiated settlement by whatever means available, a fully funded education system - new money, not reallocating from within the current budgets, and students back in school ASAP. We also wrote to the Minister of Finance with copies to 'everyone' asking that all savings from job action be returned to education. There was an open letter to parents as well outlining our advocacy and our support for students, teachers and a speedy negotiated settlement. Our provincial organization, BCSTA, worked very hard advocating on behalf of students, boards and parents directly with the Ministry. I have spoken directly to MLAs Dan Ashton and Linda Larson regarding the job action and the need for increased funding. The Board met with Dan and Linda in the spring and met with Dan again in September. A meeting with Linda will be scheduled in the very near future.

From time to time during the strike, I visited with teachers on the picket lines at Naramata, West Bench and Kaleden. They are passionate about students and the work they do. We are fortunate to have so many talented and hardworking teachers in our district.

I am putting my name forward for another term as the RDOS trustee representative on the SD67 Board of Education. The election will take place on November 15th. Thank you very much for your support over. Any questions? Call 250-497-6462 or email gmanning@summer.com.

Kaleden Museum ~ A History Tid Bit

1910 was a year of progress in Kaleden. The irrigation system was under construction. The water was taken from Shatford Creek by means of a diversion dam and crossed the valley at Allen Grove through an inverted syphon of wood stave pipe. From that point it was conducted by ditch and wooden flume to a point on Marron Creek, 1 1/2 miles west of the junction of what is now Highways 3 and 97 where an intake was built. Because of the hilly nature of Kaleden, below the intake, the only alternative for distribution was a system of pressurized pipes. The pipe was made of Douglas fir staves wound with heavy tempered steel wire and covered with pitch and two thicknesses of burlap. It was built to withstand 300 pounds pressure and varied in diameter from two to 18 inches. Much of the original pipes lasted for over 30 years. One of the pieces of construction was a concrete lined ditch at the north end of Marron Valley, designed to prevent the soil washing down a steep slope. This was one of the first pieces of concrete irrigation ditch built in the Okanagan.

Although work on the irrigation system was progressing rapidly, no water would arrive in time to supply irrigation for the 27,000 fruit trees newly planted in the spring of 1910, trees planted almost entirely by Harry Corbett and Frank Harrison. Water had to be hauled manually to keep the young trees alive. The apple trees, which would make up the mature orchard, were planted in a grid 30' x 30' which would result • in about 50 trees per acre. Soft fruits or pears (called fillers) were planted interspersed between the apple trees, only to be pulled out over the next 15 years, as the trees grew and crowding took place. The trees planted in 1910 would not produce any soft fruit until 1913 and no apples until 1914.

A great deal of activity centered around the lake. Supplies for the water system and the first buildings were brought in by boat. A.S. Hatfield had purchased two boats, and his father, an old sea captain from eastern Canada commanded the fleet and plied the waters from Okanagan Falls to Penticton, ferrying people, mail and

goods. At first there were no wharves here and the boats were just driven onto the beach. But finally, a low structure was built just in front of today's 1912. That served Kaleden well enough for its first few years. Despite the primitive conditions, families began to arrive, but you will have to wait until November for the next instalment.


