



FROM THE DIRECTOR

"The falling leaves
drift by the window

The falling leaves of autumn are poignant reminders of the sunny days of summer now past, yet foretell the inevitable winter weather soon to come. As we gather the abundance of harvest from our gardens, fields and vineyards, we reminisce wistfully about the falling leaves ...

Sadly, we think of those struggling with serious illness, or who have now moved on

from our earthly world. And, our hearts go out to the families of those young children whose lives were lost in recent weeks; such as 5 year old James who was taken so tragically in a bizarre crosswalk accident in Penticton a few days ago; or of the refugee children washing up on faraway beaches, as they flee the tyranny of religious extremism in the Middle East.

So, this is a time to hold close to those who are near and dear to us, and to the thankful for all the blessings we share in this abundant, peaceful land.

Shona Steps In \sim I am pleased to announce that, following an extensive search by RDOS senior management, Shona Schleppe has now been hired to take over as manager of the restructured Community Services Office for Area 'D', (the former EDO), which is located near the IGA store in Okanagan Falls. Shona will be assisted part time by Denise Melenka, who has served Area 'D' residents so diligently for the past several years, and on alternate days by Vickie Hansen who has recently joined the RDOS rural services team. Shona has more to say by way of introduction to her new role as community services manager, elsewhere in this issue.

I'm sure that residents are going to be delighted by the improved access to "one stop services" offered by Shona and her team. Do drop in, or contact the office at 778-515-5520.

Okanagan Falls Town Center Design Project ~ As the old saying goes, "Rome was not built in a day". But, Rome could never have been built at all without a plan! The recent design workshop (called a charrette) was led by our consultants Bob Ransford and Lance Berelowitz. It proved to be a great success! Approximately 30 residents of OK Falls, other interest-holders, RDOS planning staff and experts from the Ministry of Transportation participated in a full-day of "brainstorming" sessions on Friday, September 18th. This was followed on Saturday by a working session of the consultants and their design team who prepared streetscapes and concept plans for a public open house held later in the afternoon. Some 50 members of the community then turned out to discuss these conceptual plans and proposals for the future of downtown Okanagan Falls.

Most of the participants seemed to favour a refined version of the Option B scenario, which had been proposed last year. This would orient the future town centre northward from Highway 97 to the Skaha lakeshore, clustered around the vacant flea market property and extending east-west from Main Street to Cedar Street.

In coming weeks, the consultants will compile their final report, with recommendations for next steps. Meanwhile, interested residents may view the design sketches and conceptual plans by visiting our Community Services Office in Okanagan Falls.

The Senior's Housing Project ~ Our application continues to move forward. Readers may recall that the South Skaha Senior's Housing Society has proposed a 30 unit project of supportive (and affordable) senior's housing to be located on four vacant lots along Willow Street, just south of Veterans Way. Three of these lots are presently owned

by the Legion Branch 227, while the fourth (corner) lot is owned by the Catholic Diocese of Nelson.

The proposed three story project will cost about \$6 million dollars to build. An equity bridge of approximately \$4 million dollars value has been requested from the BC Housing Corporation in response to their recent proposal call for senior's projects in the Okanagan. The balance of \$2 million will be mortgage-financed by the Housing Society, with possible backing by the RDOS. The mortgage funds would be paid back with proceeds from a rental rate of about \$765 per unit.

The Okanagan Falls application led in July to an audit visit to the proposed site by an official from BC Housing. This was followed by a request for the Housing Society Board, chaired by Lorraine Harrison, to attend a meeting with a panel of BC Housing officials on September 16th. At that meeting, which I attended, BC Housing asked the Society a number of detailed questions about financial and operations issues. I believe that the project has a good chance of success, but will need some further refinement. And, it's good that our MLA Linda Larson is helping to push the application along in Victoria.

Meetings with Ministers at the UBCM ~ As I write this column, I am attending the Annual Convention of the Union of BC Municipalities, along with several of my fellow RDOS directors and our Chair, Mark Pendergraft. Together we have met with several Provincial Ministers on such diverse topics as urban deer management, highways and road safety issues (with Minister Todd Stone) and a request of Minister Bill Bennett that the BC Utilities Commission be held more accountable to public concerns in regulating the practices and rate structures of Fortis BC.

I also led an important presentation to the Deputy Premier, Hon. Rich Coleman to advocate his support for our proposed senior's housing project in Okanagan Falls. He is already very familiar with our application to BC Housing, for which he has Ministerial responsibility. While Minister Coleman was not able to commit his immediate support, he did offer some helpful advice on how to move our application forward. In particular, he said it would be essential to consolidate the four lots along Willow Street under one title or "head lease" in order to provide certainly of project ownership to BC Housing and other lenders, if we wish to qualify for project approval.

Sewer Extension to Skaha Estates and Kaleden ~ I'm sorry to report that our application for a \$6 million capital grant from the Building Canada Infrastructure Program, which RDOS applied for last February has been turned down. I haven't yet found out why we were rejected. The grant would have enabled us to move forward with the first phase of our sewer extension project to connect Skaha Estates (and later, Kaleden) with the new Sewage Treatment Plant at OK Falls. The sewer extension is essential to the long-term protection of water quality in South Skaha Lake. So, I am hoping we will be able to secure the required 2/3 funding from our two senior levels of government when the next round of infrastructure grants become available. For now, we have to wait until after the upcoming Federal election to see how much new infrastructure money will become available, and when

Electoral Area "D-1" Official Community Plan (OCP) Update

The Official Community Plan (OCP) for Electoral Area "D-1", an area that includes the communities of Apex, Kaleden, St. Andrews and Twin Lakes, is moving forward rapidly.

"The project's Citizens Committee and RDOS staff have been working hard over the summer and will have a draft ready to share in November", says Tom Siddon, Director for Area "D".

Work has focused on the issue areas residents identified as the Plan Area priorities through community engagement activities and a resident survey. The top three issue areas, and some of the changes the new OCP is proposing to address them, are highlighted here.

Natural Environment:

OCP Goal: Steward and protect the area's natural features and systems, including sensitive and endangered ecosystems, fish and wildlife habitats, and wildlife corridors.

- NEW local area policies for Kaleden, Apex, Twin Lakes, St. Andrews and Other Areas (Green Mountain Road, Farleigh Lake, Marron Valley) with stronger environmental focus and supporting policies
- NEW reorganized and expanded OCP section on the Natural Environment and Conservation featuring separate sections on Riparian and Foreshore Areas, Terrestrial Areas, and Conservation Areas
- NEW and expanded section on Environmentally Sensitive Development Permit (ESDP) Areas with mapping developed with South Okanagan Stewardship and Conservation Program

Water Resources:

OCP Goal: Protect and manage water resources, including both surface and groundwater, for residential and agricultural uses, and for ecosystem health and wellbeing.

- NEW surface and groundwater conservation and management policies throughout revised OCP, including direction to develop a groundwater bylaw for the Regional District to better protect, manage and steward groundwater resources in "D-1" and other electoral areas
- NEW policies to require additional information for Twin Lakes and St. Andrews for aquifer protection

Infrastructure and Services:

OCP Goal: Improve and expand infrastructure in designated rural growth areas, including water and wastewater treatment systems, and cellular and internet coverage and connectivity for all settled areas without compromising the protection of the Dominion Radio Astrophysical Observatory from Radio Frequency Interference (RFI).

- REVISED AND EXPANDED policies on protecting operations at the Dominion Radio Astrophysical Observatory (DRAO), a major national research facility and economic generator for "D-1"
- **REVISED AND EXPANDED** water supply/sustainability policies with support for additional groundwater monitoring
- NEW policies to support the expansion of sewer service to Kaleden and improve and expand other regional services, including cellular and internet access

The final phase of community engagement will begin in late October and November, which will include additional online information, and online and hard copy surveys, as well as an Open House on November 18th at Kaleden Elementary. In the meantime, be sure to check out the Area D-1 OCP Update website at www.D-1update.ca.

Area "D" Governance Study

with Bob Daly, Chair

What is "Governance"? Governance is the process of decision-making and the process by which decisions are implemented. Unfortunately,

the complexity of governance is difficult to capture in a simple definition. The need for governance exists anytime a group of people come together to accomplish an end result. Good governance is an indeterminate term used in international development literature to describe how public institutions conduct public affairs and manage public resources. Though the governance literature proposes several definitions, most rest on three dimensions: authority, decision-making and accountability.

Why proceed with a Governance Study? The purpose of the Governance Study is to review and to consider methods of improvement of local governance, including service delivery to the communities of Electoral Area "D", within the context of the Regional District system. Incorporation is not under consideration through this study; nor is the study or its recommendations intended to displace or interfere with existing initiatives within any community of Area "D".

What is involved in the Governance Study? Area "D" is a widespread region, encompassing the communities of Upper Carmi, Heritage Hills and Lakeshore Highlands, Skaha Estates, Twin Lakes, Apex, Okanagan Falls, St. Andrews, North East part of Vaseux Lake, Kaleden, and their surrounding areas. The key to the success of the study will be to engage as many citizens as possible from each community in order to accurately assess the governance and service issues which may be specific to a particular community or which may be shared throughout the entire area. To this end, the Governance Study Committee together with the Consultant will provide a variety of fact sheets on services, will conduct two surveys, and will host three open forums to give citizens from each community the opportunity to learn more and thus give valuable feedback during this process.

Who is conducting the Governance Study? A volunteer group of local residents from across Area "D" make up the Governance Study Committee. Those members are: Bob Daly (Chair), Tamara Browne, Navid Chaudry, Leslie D'Andrea, Sam Hancheroff, Larry Kenyon, Doug Lychak, Myleen Mallach, Gerry Stewart, and Eleanor Walker. This committee will work with the hired consultants, Leftside Partners Inc., who were selected based on their strong qualifications and experience with local governance, their successful work with public consultation, and on the thoroughness of their work plan.

When is the Governance Study happening? The Governance Study is already underway and the completion with recommendations is expected in the Fall of 2016. The committee and consultants met in September to discuss the public engagement/consultation plan and to address time lines for the study. Future Governance Study Committee meetings will be open to the public and a schedule will be developed and posted online for those meetings. Water Main Flushing ~ Please be advised that the Irrigation District will be flushing the water mains from October 1-15, 2015. During this period you may experience some discoloration or sediment in the water. If you do experience this, please run your cold water tap until the water is clear. To avoid any inconvenience, please check the water prior to doing laundry.

Centennial Park Beautification ~ It has been a number of years since work has gone into Centennial Park other than routine maintenance. With the addition of the beautiful band shell and the increased use of the park, it is clear we have some restorative work to be done on the lawn and some improvements to make around the band shell. This work will be done throughout the fall and continued next spring.

In addition, the Irrigation District would like to increase the number of memorial benches in the park, similar to the existing concrete benches already present, if there is enough interest from the public. If you are interested in being a donor, contact the Office for more information.

The Irrigation District also welcomes any suggestions you may have toward the improvement of Centennial Park.

Frauds and Scams

While any time is scam time as far as the crooks are concerned, with the cooler weather people are more likely to shift their activities inside and thus be in a better position to get calls or information on the internet that is not legitimate.

One scam that has been hanging around our area since spring is the one where you get an email or phone call from Revenue Canada claiming that you have a refund and they just need some information to process it. They start out with getting just a little information to gain your trust and to appear legitimate. However, you will then be asked for more information until they get some financial information or access to your bank accounts or credit cards. Revenue Canada does not send out email requesting payments or giving refunds.

Another one that remains has various versions of the old "you have won a new Mercedes, a trip or cash or the infamous inheritance where they need your help to secure. Sounds good and as you listen to what they have to offer, remember that these shysters have one thing in common, they want money from you and they plan to give you nothing. They usually disguise it as shipping, taxes, or processing fees. They want you to send them these small fees in advance, a couple hundred dollars or whatever they feel they can get from you. People get caught up in that for a couple of hundred dollars, so they can get a "Mercedes". Often they suspect it might be a scam, but also struggle with what if it is legit, for \$200 I will have a new Mercedes. So, they send the \$200 and of course they don't receive the new Mercedes. Instead, another call for some more money to cover another unexpected cost. You are suspicious, but they can be very good sales persons, and after all you have already sent them \$200, so you don't want to lose that and get nothing so you send more money. This will continue until either you finally say 'no' or they rob you of all your money, and there will never be a Mercedes or anything else delivered to you.

While there are many other versions and scams, they all share one thing in common in that they are all meant to take your money or your identity so as to get money. Most of these scams originate outside of Canada and are impossible for police to investigate and the chance of getting your money back is slim to none. Their corporate headquarters are often nothing more than a vehicle or rented room with a cell phone or lap top computer.

Protect yourself by doing your due diligence before you ever part with any of your money or information. Simply hang up on these scam callers or if you feel they may be legitimate, ask that they send you information in the mail for you to review and consider. This usually weeds out those that are not legitimate, as they have nothing to send you because then you would have time to review the material and realize it is a scam. Delete suspicious emails without opening to prevent them from gaining access to your computer. Ensure that you have proper security protection enabled on your computer and devices. Remember: If it sounds too good to be true, it usually is and you seldom get anything worthwhile for nothing. And, despite all the technology and advancements, it is still true today that a fool and his money are soon parted!

Take Time for You with Chair Yoga

If you suffer lower back pain there are a number of muscle groups, or combinations of muscle groups, that could be involved. One of these common possibilities is the hip flexors, which are some of the strongest muscles in your body. They join the thigh bone to the pelvis and lower spine. If you spend much of your day in a seated position, your hip flexors can tighten up, which can create challenges with posture. Tight hip flexors can limit the range of motion in your hips as well, making it difficult to raise your legs.

Practicing the following exercise on a regular basis can help to loosen your hip flexors and reduce back tension. Loosening the hip flexors will allow you to lift your legs higher to avoid tripping and prevent falls.



Bent Knee Lift

- 1. Sit in a firm chair with a straight back, feet flat on the floor
- If needed, a thick book or foot stool under the feet will help. Feet must be flat on the floor
- Notice the lower back and tummy. Think about how they are working.
- 4. Pull the tummy in towards the back
- 5. Push the lower back into the back of the chair
- 6. Keep breathing and hold
- 7. While holding this position, lift one knee
- 8. Hold for a few breaths then lower, before repeating
- 9. Do several in a row on one leg, taking a rest when needed
- 10. Repeat on the other side

Be sure to relax the neck and shoulders while you're doing this exercise and remember to keep breathing. Try to breathe normally, through the nose. I'd love to hear about your success with this exercise. Feel free to call or email the studio if you have questions or comments.



Why do I feel so tired Doc?

This is a very common question in all Doctors' offices. Unexplained fatigue is a mysterious malady and the cause can be elusive. Often, regular physical and laboratory exams come up normal to the frustration of everyone involved.

In my experience and review of the science on this topic, two causes stand out as the most significant contributors to chronic, unrelenting fatigue. Keep in mind that most ailments have more than one cause. It is more a case of many factors contributing to body systems being overwhelmed (like the straw that broke the

camel's back), than a single cause. The human body can deal with many insults, but at some point if too many things are overloading it, a tipping point is reached where systems start to fail. It is at this point that chronic symptoms such as fatigue can set in.

The two main causes of fatigue that I wish to discuss today are Adrenal Fatigue and Mitochondrial Fatigue. The two tiny adrenal glands which are located above our kidneys, release hormones such as adrenaline and cortisol to help our minds and bodies cope with stress. Ideally, they are in a relaxed but alert state, maintaining vigilance in preparation for stressful events to occur. When stress to the body and/or mind occurs, they quickly act by releasing stress hormones to help us cope with the stressor (this is commonly known as the fightflight or freeze response). This system works well if stressful events in our life are rare and intermittent. However, in today's busy world, the adrenal glands can be stuck on causing them to run out of resources to produce stress hormones and ultimately becoming less effective and, in fact, burned out. When this happens we can lose our ability to sleep soundly and cope with even minor stressors. A vicious cycle ensues in which the body becomes increasingly more fatigued, and relief is hard to find because the body cannot rest.

The mitochondria are tiny organelles that produce energy within our cells. Thousands of mitochondria reside in every cell, turning raw energy sources from food and oxygen into high octane ATP energy. ATP provides an effective, powerful resource for powering our physical needs. Over time and with an excess of toxins, poor nutrition, stress, lowered hormones, chronic infections etc., our mitochondria can also burn out. This has been termed mitochondrial dysfunction. It is a state of low oxygen utilization leading to low ATP production. To rev up the mitochondria, it is necessary to improve the manner in which oxygen is utilized by the cells.

Lifestyle factors are the key to successfully re-energizing the adrenal glands as well as the mitochondria. Regular sleep, regular exercise, regular meals, stress management, high quality natural food, avoiding processed foods and chemicals, hormone balance, and detoxification all contribute to the regeneration of both the mitochondria and the adrenal glands. Often, underlying latent viral, yeast, or bacterial infections are contributing to ongoing fatigue. New genetic testing for microbes can help uncover these infections which can be difficult to find with traditional testing methods.



Gout and Diet/Lifestyle: The Do's & Dont's ~

Known to humanity for millennia, gout was referred to as the "rich man's disease" because it was supposedly more common among the wealthy who could afford to indulge in seafood, meat and alcohol, foods rich in purines. These naturally occurring chemicals exist throughout the body. When broken down, they form uric acid, which under the right conditions, may accumulate and crystallize in just about any place, causing severe pain, debilitation and potentially disfigurement.

Nowadays, the prevailing view on diet and gout is a little more nuanced. High uric acid occurs due to enhanced production or reduced elimination, or both, and these are largely determined by genetics. However, diet certainly plays a role. Consumption of low-fat dairy products, for example, has been shown to lower uric acid and may reduce the frequency of gout flares. Likewise, eating cherries on regular basis has been associated with reduced attacks, as has consumption of caffeinated beverages such as coffee and tea (in moderation), in addition to daily Vitamin C. Finally, adequate water intake is crucial to preventing crystallization.

In contrast, seafoods such as tuna, scallops and sardines have been associated with higher risk, as have organ meats like liver. High-fructose corn syrup, sometimes labelled as "glucose/fructose" is also bad news and shows up in soft drinks and many processed foods. As far as alcohol goes, beer tends to be the biggest offender, followed by liqueurs. The association between wine intake and gout is less clear, although higher alcohol consumption generally means higher risk. Perhaps most compelling is the link with excessive caloric intake, as overweight individuals consistently display a higher risk of gout.

In closing, if you are struggling with gout or elevated uric acid and are looking for ways to reduce your chance of flares, consider these dietary and lifestyle approaches. Your joints will thank you! See you in November and stay tuned for info on flu shots, slated to arrive later this month!

During the summer, our district operations staff worked hard to make our school clean and welcoming for the school opening. Specifically at Okanagan Falls Elementary the facilities projects were renovation of the computer lab to offices and a meeting area, and installation of a handicap ramp on the northwest corner of the community section of the building. School District 53 provided the labour for the ramp and Okanagan Falls Parks & Recreation received a grant for the materials. School Trustee Report for SD67

Over the summer, the City of Penticton completed permanent traffic calming measures at Wiltse, Uplands, Carmi and Parkway Elementary Schools. The temporary delineators that reduced the road width have been replaced with a permanent concrete curb line that serves to slow traffic. Additional signage will be provided to address the crossing of pedestrians and cyclists at the crosswalks.

The District's Financial Statements are audited annually and once again the task was completed by BDO Canada. Jonathan McGraw from BDO commented that the statements were in order and were prepared according to GAAP (Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) as per Ministry requirements. He also commented that the School District has very good internal controls in place.

The new K-9 Curriculum is complete and teachers are encouraged to use all or parts of it for this year. It will be fully implemented in the 2016/17 school year. The grades 10-12 curriculum will be available for a trial period next year and fully implemented in 2017/18. The new curriculum was developed by educators from around the province.

Changes to Provincial Exams and 'FSA's' will be rolled out on a trial basis in September of 2016/17. New reporting guidelines are also being developed. More detailed information is available on the School District website at www.sd67.bc.ca.





Penticton Creek Kokanee Project

By Larry Martin

For several years, Kokanee returns to Penticton Creek have been estimated using generally accepted sample methods. In order to ensure these estimates are accurate, a fish trap has been installed near the Penticton Art Gallery. A fence is used to ensure all fish pass through the trap and to prevent those that have already passed from being trapped again. Each morning the fish are counted and released to continue their journey to the spawning beds. The sample estimate will be compared to the actual count in order to calibrate the sample procedure for future years.

The Penticton Creek Fish Trap was used to collect parent fish that provided 50,000 Kokanee eggs. These will be raised over the winter at the hatchery and will be returned to Penticton Creek into the same spawning beds where more than 3,000 fish have returned. The hatchery uses water from Penticton Creek, thus it is expected the eggs will mature at a similar rate as those in the creek.

Protecting A Lake That Means So Much To Me

The lake means peace and beauty and life itself.

It means watching the sun rise on the quiet waters, hearing the birds sing. It is seeing the young Eagles grow from squawking youngsters, demanding adolescence, and finally the majestic bird of prey that they are. Hearing the Osprey swoosh overhead and watching it dive into the water to catch its prey. Paddling through reeds and noticing a dozing Painted Turtle in the afternoon sun. Discovering a bird nest over our front door and watching the young chicks peeking out of the nest waiting for mom and dad to return with breakfast.

It is the sounds that drift over the lake. It is the sounds of neighbours laughing and chatting over a glass of wine in the early evening. It is laughter and horseplay of children splashing in the lake. It is the sounds of friends calling out from their boats as they paddle by.

And while I have touched on the many things the lake means to me, I have not mentioned the most basic thing it means. In fact, it is so basic that I take it for granted and often forget about it. The lake means LIFE - without the Lake none of these things that mean so much to me would be there, including me. Our lake provides water, food, and enjoyment to its people and its wildlife.

Earth is covered in 70% water and unfortunately 40-50% of our waters are impaired or threatened. "Impaired" means that the water body does not support one or more of its intended uses. This could mean that the water is not suitable to drink, swim in or to consume the fish that was caught there.

We are just now beginning to understand how all the water is connected and how we are impairing our lakes and the all the water around us. We must each make it our job to educate ourselves and start protecting all of our waters for everyone.

The RDOS is pleased to announce that the Regional Heritage Strategic Plan (RHSP) was adopted by the

Regional District Board of Directors at the September 17, 2015 Board Meeting. In late 2013, the Board retained consultants from Denise Cook Design to identify existing heritage sites and values throughout the region. The comprehensive plan incorporates valuable input from a regional Working Group, extensive public consultation and contributions from local heritage experts and societies.

Based on the objectives of the RHSP, an implementation strategy was developed outlining actions to achieve the goals of a heritage conservation service in the region. The recommendations include major action items intended to be carried out in Year 1 (2016) to build a foundation for heritage conservation and promotion throughout the region. The implementation in Year 1 emphasizes the creation of the regional service, the formation of the Regional Heritage Committee and adding several sites to the heritage register.

Historic places are educational resources that help people understand and appreciate architecture, technology, art and culture. repositories of local history, historic places also help us understand our own communities and remind us of our responsibilities to past and future generations. The Regional Heritage Strategic Plan is a huge step forward for heritage conservation within the Region. Projects like these help the RDOS to foster dynamic and effective community relationships, while also meeting public needs through the development and implementation of key services.

Kaleden Museum ~ A History Tid Bit

In 1919, foreclosure proceedings were instigated against the Kaleden Development Company and by 1921 the assets, together with a proportionate share of the irrigation system, was taken over by a group of English businessmen under the name of Kaleden Estates. This group included Lord de Vesci, one of the original investors.

At first, the Kaleden Estates group put up an additional \$31,500 to help rebuild and extend the irrigation system, which had been constituted an improvement district under the BC Water Act, when the Kaleden Development Company ran into financial difficulties during the war. Later on, in May of 1928, the Kaleden Estates sent Mr. E.N.M. Vernon to manage their holdings here.

Starting in 1929, Mr. Vernon began replanting the 250 acres of abandoned orchards and much of the land north of the post office was planted under his direction. He remained as manager and as an active community worker until he died in November 1943. He lived in a small home on a five acre orchard, which he had purchased and planted for himself just South of the PetroCanada station by Highway 97. When he passed away, he left his home and orchard to the community of Kaleden; the proceeds to be used to build a community recreation centre for the children of Kaleden. Perhaps sometime in the future we should think about renaming the hall the ENM Vernon Memorial Hall in memory of his generous gift.

From 1943 to 1956, the holdings were managed by Emery Lockhart. In 1956, the remaining property of the Kaleden Estates were sold to a Mr. Harder of Victoria and shortly thereafter he resold to Kaleden Orchards.

You might find it interesting to know the final disposition of the original 3000 acres purchased by James Ritchie.

- 203 acres were sold to private ownership prior to 1921.
- Several hundred acres were taken up by roads, cemetery or turned over the BC government.
- 262 acres were deeded to Kaleden Irrigation as settlement of taxes.
- 55 acres were abandoned as unsuitable for planting.
- 245 acres were sold to private ownership from 1921-1954 in 5 & 10 acre parcels.
- 1759 acres were sold as ranch land including the Gillespie and Junction Ranches.
- 161 acres, plus several townsite lots, were developed and held until 1956 when they were finally sold.

Thus the Kaleden Estates along with its predecessor, the Kaleden Development Company, and James Ritchie, all of whom played significant roles in the development of our community, finally faded into the annals of Kaleden history.
